**A Wife of Habes Corpus Asked for and Refused.**  
It was stated a few days ago that Judge Cloud was assaulted at Lincolnville, by a man whom he had fined and sentenced to jail for a disturbance in Court but who through the kindness of His Honor was subsequently released. After the attempted assault His Honor ordered him to be imprisoned for thirty days for contempt of Court. Friday night, Mr. John D. Shaw of Lincolnville appeared before Judge Rynn in this city to ask for a writ of Habeas Corpus for the release of the prisoner whose name is Lee Gehlun on the ground that the charge of contempt could not be sustained. His Honor Judge Rynn, after considering the case, decided that he had no jurisdiction, and consequently declined to issue the writ.—Char. Observer.

**A Terrible Epidemic in Anson.**

A return, as prescribed on Form No. 1, is required by law of every person liable to Special Tax as above.
