TIME AND PLACE OF HOLDING THE CONVENTION.

Thursday, June 13th, 1878, was the time named for holding the Convention, and Raleigh was designated as the most suitable place.

On motion the Central Committee was directed to prepare and publish an address to the people of the State.

Resolved, That the Executive Committee in their address request the several Judicial Districts from which Superior Court Judges are to be chosen to hold District Conventions and recommend to the State Convention candidates for the office of Judge from their respective districts.
