C. The recent excitement about diphtheria here is without adequate cause. We have had the disease amongst us, and it has caused some deaths. What community in the State has escaped similar visitations? Diphtheria, scarlet fever, &c., go into all communities from the mountains to the sea board. There is no exemption anywhere. Diphtheria's visit to us, leaves us abundant cause for thankfulness that it has touched us so lightly. For the present week—

He broke into Benj. Ketchey's house only a few days back and robbed it of bed clothes, wearing apparel, &c. This is the fourth burglary Jim has committed. His time ought to be growing short. He made a full confession of his recent offenses thinking no doubt, that it would facilitate his return to the pen.

### The Diphtheria in Salisbury.

Probably through fear of alarming its readers, our correspondent does not tell to what extent the diphtheria prevails in that town. Our information, received from citizens of Salisbury, indicates really an alarming state of affairs there. Col. John Holt has brought his children to Concord and other families have sent theirs to different places. The disease is far from having run its course in Salisbury and is likely to continue for some time.—Concord Sun.

Last week we gave a statement of new cases, supplied by the physicians again, and the Sun will find a weekly report in this paper. There is no desire to conceal anything, nor on the other hand to make a needless display. The simple truth is aimed at and that ought to be satisfactory to all.

### DEATH OF MRS. C. E. BROWN.

Mrs. C. E. Brown, wife of the late Peter M. Brown, and step-mother of Col. John L. Brown, of this city, and mother of Messrs. Lee, W. H. and James Crawford, of Salisbury, an aged and highly esteemed lady, died Saturday evening in Burke county under the following circumstances: She had been at Glen Alpine springs for several weeks, and Friday evening started from the springs to the railroad station in company with two other ladies and two gentlemen. When about half way one of the wheels of the hack gave way and she was thrown from one side to the other, receiving a slight bruise on the head. Owing to the accident, the party was compelled to stop at a house near by, where they spent the night. Mrs. Brown suffered no pain from the slight wound she had received, and the next morning arose before any one else and spoke of having an excellent appetite for breakfast. While eating she suddenly became very ill, and lingered in this condition till 2 o'clock in the afternoon when she died.—Char. Ob.

Mrs. Brown's remains arrived here Monday morning in the care of her son Mr. R. R. Crawford, and several lady friends, and remained here till Monday night and was then accompanied by sorrowing sons and relatives to Charlotte for burial in Elmwood Cemetery, Tuesday morning.

The numerous friends of the deceased here, mourn the loss of one who was indeed highly esteemed by them for qualities of heart and mind enabling to the human family; and her sons will never cease to rise up and call her blessed.

### Salisbury District Conference.

The Conference assembled at Mooreville on the 21st inst., Rev. D. R. Brubaker, Presiding Elder, in the chair. Quite a number of ministers and delegates were present at the opening services.

The business of the conference consisted principally of reports from the preachers, and from their reports it appeared that there was a good religious influence in the district; in some places gracious revivals. Many new church edifices have been built and are in process of building. In nearly all parts of the district there are Sunday Schools and in many places great interest is taken in them and they are doing much good. The financial reports showed that the contributions for the support of the ministry were very small; in many cases not a third of the preachers salary for the year having been paid.

Various resolutions on Sunday Schools, books, periodicals, papers, finances, education, &c., were adopted.

The religious services during the Conference and on Sunday following were of a deeply interesting character. Rev. E. A. Yates, of Wilmington, and Dr. J. B. Bobbitt, of Raleigh, and others preached sermons full of power and religion. On Sunday services were held in the Methodist and Presbyterian churches and in the Academy. Sunday evening at 3 o'clock, there was a Sunday School mass meeting in the Presbyterian church. The singing was good, and the addresses by Rev. T. A. Boon, Rev. J. J. Remy and Rev. E. A. Yates, were rich in thought, wit and earnestness.

Mooreville is a flourishing little town and bids fair to be a place of note at no distant day. It is situated in a good country, is made up of a good class of people and a healthy moral tone prevades the community. It has good churches, several stores and a good school under the control of Messrs. Frontis & Leazar. [This report was accidentally overlooked in making up our last paper.]
