

**TURNIPS.**—The cultivation of turnips and rutabagas, consists in keeping free from weeds and thinning out to a proper distance. One good root at every nine inches, is far better than two or three poor ones in that space. To have good, sound roots of any kind, sufficient room must be given.

**SMUT IN CORN.**—Smut is poisonous, or at least very injurious, and care should be taken to prevent it from being eaten with fodder. It is becoming very common in corn. It might be well to pass through the corn-field with a sharp knife and a basket, and cut off all the bunches of smut and smutty ears, and carry them out where they may be burned. As one square inch of surface may contain 4,000,000 spores of smut, and every spore is capable of producing a smutty plant, it is important to carefully destroy every ball of smut.

**BEETS AND MANGELS.**—Early sown beets and mangels, may be harvested late this month. If left later, the roots may become hollow and stringy. An over-grown root may be large, but its size is no indication of its value. We harvest our early sown mangels as soon as the larger ones become hollow, and find they ripen in the pits as well or better, than if left in the ground later. The tops may be fed to cows or sheep with benefit.

**THE BONNIE BLUE FLAG.**  
**THE BATTLE FLAGS OF THE SOUTHERN CONFEDERACY.**  
*The Torn, Riddled and Tattered Remains of Our Great Civil War—What Became of Them.*

The upper portion of the house now used by one of the clerks of the Adjutant General's office, the first floor of which is set aside for the safe keeping and display of the captured battle flags of the late war. The rooms present a unique appearance. The walls are covered with the tattered remnants of the banners. The ceilings are hidden by bunting. The windows are draped and mantles festooned and doorways covered under by the flags, while hundreds of them are pigeon-holed and only unrolled to show the curious. The front room contains the flags captured from our armies by the Confederates, numbering two hundred and thirty-four. They are in every degree of condition, from the bullet-riddled and moth-eaten to the perfect. These colors were all recaptured at the fall of Richmond, when they were found in the war office of that city. The Northern States are all represented by stripes of bunting, on which are emblazoned the coats-of-arms belonging to each section.

Among other pennants in this room possessing a general interest I noticed specially General Sheridan's staff flag, and from its torn and shred condition, its imagination can readily read its history. This flag was lost in the valley at a time when Sheridan was temporarily absent in Washington. On his return he found his army had been routed and driven back from its advanced position in a demoralized condition. Without stopping to consider a "plan of campaign," he sprang into his saddle and made the side-hill charge in "historic verse." He reached his army in time to infuse enthusiasm into his men, and the next day led them to the most brilliant victory of the war. Farther close to his ensign is an Ohio banner, the number of its regiment shot away, but its record of forty-five battles is one of which the State may be proud. It would narrate in victory and defeat, glory and death, and all the horrors of those dreadful times. The flag of Berdan's sharpshooters has inscribed on the few folds left the fact that it was carried aloft in twenty-five engagements, and they the most important in the war. Our inspection was most especially invited to a square bit of silk, one of snowy whiteness, fringed with rich deep buff. The silk is yellow and mildewed and frayed. The fringe is rusty, and there are but figures and letters to tell of which our heroic men this scrap of luster once belonged, and these are the "Sixty-ninth New York Volunteers." There is a dark blood stain over this token of ownership, but the Irish legion who fought so bravely under the leadership of the gallant Corcoran are not slow to recognize this streamer as the one under which they were led to battle by the man who so generously gave his life to help save his adopted country.

In the back room are the Confed-

erate flags captured by the boys in blue. I marked as a curious fact that there were few Stars and Bars, which many suppose to have been the emblem of the Southern Confederacy. I was informed by the gentleman in charge that this insignia was only used during the first twelve months of the war, and abandoned because at a distance it was difficult to distinguish the Stars and Bars from the Union Stars and Stripes, and on the recommendation of General Beauregard the Confederacy adopted the Southern Cross as their ensign. In this room are 534 flags taken from the secession forces, some from each State. Most of them are decorated with legends and symbols. A white silk banner, worn and mutilated, belonging to an Alabama regiment, bears on its scarred face the declaration that, "We fight for our homes, our wives and our children." An enthusiastic Alabamian has offered \$600 for the worn silk. The terse sentence pregnant with noble meaning, sets forth emphatically the inspirations under which the men of the Southern country went forth to do and die.

On all of these pennants in the four corners of the cross are printed in black and gold letters the names of the battles through which they served to animate and stimulate the soldiers. The Confederate officers were much more particular in this respect than our own commanders.

Something ought to be done to preserve these flags, or in a few years more of exposure to "moth, mildew and rust" they will be reduced to absolute nothingness.

**An Accomplished Criminal.**

The Eastern penitentiary at Philadelphia contains at the present time one of the most accomplished criminals in the country in one "Colonel" Ralph Rolland, alias Louis C. Clermont, who has just been foiled in a clever scheme of jail-breaking. Clermont, who is serving out a term for participating in the famous Chambersburg Bank robbery, when the burglars got away with \$30,000 of the bank's funds, laid his plans with great care. Through a female friend he succeeded in bribing the watchman who has charge of the ferocious bloodhounds, which are kept in the jail yard, and had also a rope ladder smuggled to his cell. Dave Cuming, a notorious burglar, who occupied the adjoining apartment, had at the same time constructed a powerful jack, with which to force the skylight in the roof, and they were to be furnished with duplicate keys by the watchman. The day before that fixed for the escape, however, the three quarrelled, and Clermont, with characteristic nonchalance, exposed the whole plot to the prison authorities, and secured the suspension of the watchman. He next tried the cruelty treatment dodge, and wrote a long series of letters, detailing the alleged inhuman conduct of the penitentiary officials, and actually did succeed in deceiving the inspector and prison physician, though he failed in securing a committal to the insane asylum, which he knew would increase his opportunities of escape. Though by no means an old man, Clermont has had a remarkably sensational career. In 1873, under the assumed name of D'Elmar, he married a lady from West Philadelphia, and disappeared soon afterwards with \$20,000 worth of diamonds belonging to his bride. He was in the Confederate service in the late war, and then for a time conducted a plantation. He secured from his neighbors about \$65,000 with which he fled to California, and went into a mining speculation, from which a crooked transaction with one of the banks caused him to go to Peru with Harry Meigs, the great railroad builder. He returned to this country dead broke, and worked as a conductor on a street car for some time, then swindled a number of banks by a confidence game in connection with the well known Walter Patterson, who went into Wall street, New York, as a speculator, and finally ended in the Eastern penitentiary.

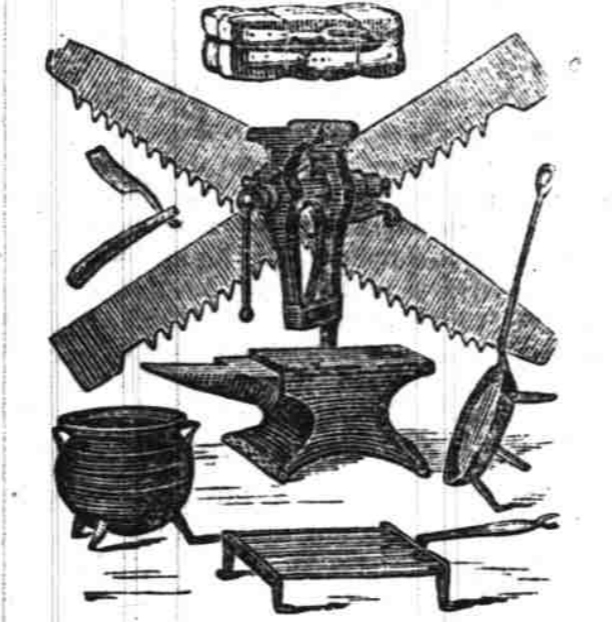
