EARLY PEACHES.—Mr. D. A. Atwell laid on our table yesterday, a perfect beauty of a peach, the name of which he has lost, ripened in his garden this year. This is the first crop for the trees and while Mr. A. was waiting for them to get mellow ripe, a little negro in the neighborhood, less patient than he, entered his garden in broad day light and picked the first and best half of the crop. Another negro candidate for the "pep"—will have to get away soon, or will be elected before he is grown.

Better put him under strict rule now while there is hope, for unchecked he is a lost boy.

WESTERN RAIL ROAD.—Capt. Arthur Frazier brought the first two through freight cars from East Tenn., last Saturday. They were loaded with coal from Coal Creek, Tenn., and billed one for Richmond and the other for Raleigh. Through freights from this branch will soon form a large part of the freightage on this road. This coal costs several dollars less in the ton than any heretofore used by the shops of the West. N. C. H. R. Co.

The pupils of Salisbury Academy were surprised Monday to learn that they would be required to give an entertainment to "a few friends of the school" on the next evening. The "few" who attended turned out to be a full house; but notwithstanding the short time for preparation, the pupils did remarkably well, reflecting much credit on Miss Gilmer and Mr. R. M. Davis, the teachers, and on themselves.

CONCERT.—The pupils of Mrs. W. H. Neave's music school gave an entertainment at Meroney's Hall, last night, which we have heard spoken of as brilliant and enchanting. The class being large the programme was necessarily long. They were assisted by Messrs. W. H. and E. B. Neave and Mr. P. P. Meroney. The Hall was comfortably filled. The proceeds, counting out necessary expenses, were given to Y. M. C. Association.

VISITING LAWYERS.—Besides the resident corps of lawyers attending the Court this week, we are pleased to see here, M. H. Pinix, W. F. Henderson, Geo. J. M. Leach, Jas. W. Ruple, F. C. Robbins, C. L. Heitman, of Lexington, N. C.; Judge D. Schenk, of Greensboro; W. H. Bailey, Charlotte; J. M. Clement, and J. A. Williamson, of Mocksville; Jos. Dubson of Salem; C. B. Watson, of Winston; and Mr. Pemberton, of Staunly.

The case of A. J. Owen, administrator of Mike O'Donnell against the Richmond & Danville Rail Road Company, where in the plaintiff sues for \$25,000, damages for the killing of Mike O'Donnell in January 1881, near Lexington, was begun on Friday and will probably occupy the Court for the remainder of the term. A large number of witnesses in this suit are in attendance. Craige, Clement, Robbins, Watson and Schenk, appear for the defendant; and Bailey, Heitman, J. M. Clement, McCorkle & Klutz, for plaintiff. No case tried at our Bar has had abler council employed on it, and it is expected it will elicit the display of the best talent these gentlemen possess.

SALISBURY GRADED SCHOOL.—CLOSING EXERCISES.—The pupils of this popular school gave a closing entertainment in Meroney's Hall last Friday evening. The citizens showed their appreciation by a full attendance, respectful attention, and the entire absence of the disorder, confusion, and cat-calls, with which young America sometimes amuses himself and annoys his neighbors. The exercises consisted in singing, callisthenics, concert reading, dialogues and declamation. The children acquitted themselves with credit and to the honor of their instructors. The eye of the spectator was pleased with the neat and tasteful appearance of the children, their animated faces and sparkling eyes. Unless Dr. Wilborn, the efficient principal, made a special selection, we should say that his school is composed of a large lot of pretty little girls and promising boys, and that the next generation in Salisbury will excel the present in intelligence, good conduct and good looks. The Graded School deserves the confidence and support of all our citizens.

SENSATIONAL.—The Charlotte Observer's account of the killing of a negro child near this place Saturday last, is slightly sensational. It is true that the south bound train that morning did kill a negro child (aged about 2 years) near the Section house between Salisbury and China Grove (not between Salisbury and the Yaquin river); it is true that the child was cut by the trucks or cow-catcher in the abdomen so that its intestines could be seen (not "half in two, as clearly as if done with a knife, the head part falling to one side and the legs to the other.") Nothing of that kind. It is also true that it had a severe cut in the forehead and that it lived at least twenty minutes instead of two minutes. The story in the Observer, says: "At the first sound of the whistle the object" (on the track) "moved, and (Sis) Bryan the engineer, "was horrified to see that it was a child instead of a dog as he supposed. The train was within a few hundred yards of the child and the engineer reversed his lever and had all the brakes applied."

"A few hundred yards!" Is it not possible to stop a train within "a few hundred yards?" How many hundred yards are required for this purpose? We trust there was no carelessness on the part of engineer Bryan, of whom we know nothing; but if he dictated the points made in the Observer's report, there are inaccuracies enough in it to discredit his whole statement and justify the Grand Jury of Rowan to investigate this case.

PUBLIC MEETING.—There will be a meeting of the citizens of Salisbury, held at the Mayor's Office on next Friday night, at 8 o'clock, to make some arrangements for properly celebrating the 4th of July. Let all good people come out and put our shoulders to the wheel and let old Salisbury show what she can do once more.

MINING INTELLIGENCE.

ERRATA.—Mr. Snider informs us that it was the New Discovery mine and not the Kendall mine he sold to Messrs. Waber & Duffield, as stated in last paper.

"Eagle Mine." Messrs. Geo. A. and Silas C. Halsey, of Newark, N. J., arrived here last Monday, and purchased the Eagle mine from Mr. J. J. Newman. The Eagle gold mine is a fine property, containing 366 acres; adjoining the Dutch Creek, Atlas and Rowan mines. These gentlemen are also interested in the Rowan Mine.

A NEW DISCOVERY.—A new gold mine has been discovered 14 miles South, in this county, on the property of Mr. Clay Yost. Its value has not yet been satisfactorily tested, though the prospect is said to be very fine. We have seen some of the gold obtained by sluicing.

Dutch Creek. This valuable property is now in fine condition for working. The great bulk of work has been confined to the proper development of the claims under ground. They have nearly 1000 feet of tunneling, shafting and drifting, and are now prepared to take out 50 or even more tons per day. Mr. Newman, the Secretary and Superintendent, calculates that there are 10,000 tons of ore in the Hill and Tip Top veins above water level. They have their chlorinating and filtering chambers ready and are now engaged in preparing their huge roasting furnaces. We confidently expect large returns from this property in a short time.

Mr. J. J. NEWMAN of the Dutch Creek Mine has furnished us with beautiful samples from that mine as coming from the following veins: Hill vein, Tip Top vein, Spring vein and Katie vein. He has also furnished us samples from the following named mines which he controls, viz: "Union," "Dagn," "Eagle," "Hoffman," "Klan," "Peeler," "Braddy," "Morgan," "Holshouser" and "Troutman". Besides these, he sends us some ore of various kinds from the company's tract of 70,400 acres of land in Mitchell County. These ores are on exhibition at our office and can be seen at any time. Samples will be sent to Raleigh and be placed on permanent exhibition in the State Museum.
