A Plan for Redistricting. A correspondent of the Chatham Record submits a plan for redistricting the State, which divides the population more equally than at present, and at the same time gives eight of the nine Districts to the Democrats.

First District.—Beaufort, Camden, Currituck, Gates, Greene, Hyde, Lenoir, Martin, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Pamlico, Pitt, Tyrrell, and Washington. Population 150,075. Jarvis' majority 375, Bennett's 503.

Second District.—Bertie, Chowan, Edgecombe, Granville, Halifax, Hertford, Northampton, Warren and Vance. Population 168,000. Buxton's majority 5,507, Duckert's 8,725.

Third District.—Carteret, Craven, Duplin, Johnston, Jones, Onslow, Sampson, Wayne and Wilson. Population 163,000. Jarvis' majority 791. Bennett's 615.

Fourth District.—Anson, Brunswick, Cabarrus, Columbus, New Hanover, Pender, Richmond, Robeson, Stanly and Union. Population 161,000. Jarvis' majority 1,056. Bennett's 687.

Fifth District.—Caswell, Durham, Franklin, Nash, Orange, Person, Rockingham and Wake. Population 163,000. Jarvis' majority 898. Bennett's 538.
