What's Best for the Negro Citizens in the Future.

[The following sensible article we clip from the Star Enterprise, an organ of the colored people, published at Goldsboro.]

The negro citizens have been used as a political stepping stone by evil designed men ever since their emancipation, greatly to the injury of the colored people and the country in which they live.

There is little political future for the negro in their world as they are the "free and home of the brave," and the sooner they find it out the better it will be for the two millions of colored voters who go to the polls once every four years and stir up strife between themselves and the dominant race in this country.

It is true that the negro has made considerable progress in the United States in the past twenty years of freedom, and has accumulated some property in defiance of race prejudices and business discriminations.

Good Roads Means High Civilization. "The two things," says the Asheville Citizen, "needed to induce immigration of Northern farmers to North Carolina, are: First, more schools; second, better dirt roads."

Next to the general prevalence of a high moral and religious tone among the people, it would be difficult to name any other things the possession of which are so desirable in a commonwealth as those mentioned by the Citizen.

We will not discuss the first named need—the schools—for the question is not debatable; but the importance of the second—good roads—does not yet seem to have impressed itself as acutely upon the popular mind.
