The Legislature amended the Public School law in many particulars, and it is no longer the loose and indefinite affair that it has been. The following are among the most important of the amendments made :

A provision has been added to Section 19 that "county board of education may for good cause, after thirty days' formal notice, suspend the county superintendent until next meeting of the said boards, when he may be removed from his office, if sufficient cause shall exist therefor. Aud the said boards shall proceed to fill the vacaucy."

Section 14 now provides that instead of the superintendent being empowered to visit a public school whenever he desires to draw an additional \$3 from the school fund into his own pocket, he only coives pay for such visits when upon a written request of a majority of a school committee such service may be necessary. Section 47 received a full share of legislative attention, by which the superintendent's pay has been reduced from \$3 to \$2 for a day's service, and his annual salary cannot now exceed three per cent., instead of five as heretofore, of the school fund apportioned to the county. That officer will also in the future be required to itemize his accounts monthly, and make affidavit thereto, "that the services therein charged have been in fact made and rendered, and that no part thereof has been paid or satisfied," and then, "it approved by the board of education," the

claim will be paid. Section 52 has a clause added, which provides that no committeeman "shall receive compensation for his services, but shall be exempt from jury service and working on public roads.

Will these amendments, as some seem to think, damage educational interests? We think not.

Mr. Scarborough, State Superintendent of Public Schools, thinks the last Legisture's "amendatory act," was very damaging to the educational cause of the State. He says:
