JACKSON, Miss., April 16.—The Supreme Court to-day in the case of Chalmers vs. Myers, Secretary of State, reversed the decision of Judge Wharton of the Circuit Court and entered judgment dismissing Chalmers' petition for a mandamus. The opinion was delivered by Judge Campbell and is very elaborate. Its conclusion is that the Secretary of State having declared Manning elected and the Governor having issued him a certificate of election the case is put beyond the jurisdiction of the courts and in such shape that Congress alone can now interfere.

The Wilmington "Star" reports the finding of a very valuable book. It says:—"We saw yesterday a very old publication in the shape of a copy of the 'Laws of North Carolina,' printed at Newbern in the reign of George II., and while Gabriel Johnston was governor of the Province. Among the acts are many relating to the Cape Fear section. The book itself is in a good state of preservation, but the binding is in rather a dilapidated condition. It was discovered recently in the cabin of a colored family two miles from Smithville, and was presented to the library of the Historical and Scientific Society by Dr. F. W. Potter."

A Spanish magistrate, shocked at the extensive adulteration food in his district, has issued a proclamation bristling with righteous indignation, in which he declares that groceries and provisions, which upon examination are "proven to be injurious to health, will be confiscated forthwith and distributed to the different charitable institutions." That man would have made an excellent Massachusetts almshouse superintendent.

We are theoretically in favor of free trade. That being impossible we should come as near it as the necessities of the government will permit. But for the present it is wisdom and justice to proceed slowly in making changes, and we stand squarely on the Democratic platform adopted by our last State convention. We do not understand that Mr. Randall's views are very different from those we entertain. But whether or not, it is manifestly unfair and unjust and improper after being associated with Mr. Randall as a Democrat during the past seven years and after profiting so much by his aid, to belittle him now because of views he always entertained and which did not impair his Democracy when we needed his assistance. We are not to be understood as favoring Mr. Randall's aspirations for the Speakership, if he has any. Our preference is for Mr. Carlyle.—News & Observer.

Many a person says no, but there is, after all, a yes inside of the no. Let your yes be yes, and your nay, nay.

Lively Times on the Sun.

Four remarkable spots have made their appearance on the sun within the last two or three days, and are now advancing, with inner motions like those of a storm cloud, toward the centre of the disk. One of these spots is of enormous size, rivaling some of the great spots which were seen at the time of the violent magnetic storms of last year, and the others are of unusual magnitude. They are not far apart, and appear to be drawing closer together. Even now, although they are near the eastern edge of the sun, and consequently are seen considerably aslant, no telescope is needed to show them like a speck of dust upon the shining globe. When they get near the centre they may be expected to make a much more imposing appearance than they do now. So great is the diameter of the sun that they will then be more than 400,000 miles nearer to us than when they first made their appearance at the edge of the disk. This distance, however, although upward of twice as great as the distance of the moon from the earth, is so small compared with the 93,000,000 miles which separate the sun and the earth, that it will make practically little difference in the appearance of the spots. The greater size and distinctness when seen near the centre will be owing to the spherical form of the surface upon which they appear. Anybody can get a clear conception of this by taking a ball and drawing a small picture upon the side of it. Only when the ball is so presented to the eye that the picture appears near the centre of the visible hemisphere will it be seen to the greater advantage.

These spots and some large ones which were seen about the 1st of the present month, and which, if they are yet in existence, must now be upon the side of the sun which is turned away from us, suggest the interesting question whether sun spots reappear at intervals at the same places on the solar globe. The location of the spots now visible closely resembles that of some of the great spots of last year, and it is suspected that several of the spots of 1882 may have reappeared in the same places after having once vanished. Owing to the lack of permanent landmarks it is exceedingly difficult to determine whether there really are places on the sun's surface where spots appear with special frequency. If it can be shown that such places exist, very important changes must be made in the present theories of the constitution of the sun, and we may be brought back to something resembling William Herschel's conception of a sun with a solid nucleus comprising a very large portion of its bulk, and surrounded by a luminous atmosphere, through which holes are made by the eruption of enormous volcanoes or by other forms of eruptive force. There are the weighty reasons for believing that the sun cannot possibly have such a nucleus.

If the present activity of the sun continues for a month longer the astronomers who have gone to the middle of the Southern Pacific Ocean to observe the total solar eclipse on May 6th will probably be witnesses of a magnificent spectacle. When great sun spots are most numerous the mysterious envelopes surrounding the sun, which come into view during a total eclipse, appear to the best advantage, present the most imposing and curious forms and extend to the greatest distances. In case the sun happens to be greatly disturbed about the 6th of May these astronomers may have an opportunity to make most interesting and important additions to our knowledge of the great ruler and centre of the solar system.

The opportunity to study the sun spots like those now visible will be less and less frequent from this time until nine or ten years hence, when another maximum point of solar activity will be reached.—New York Sun, April 15th.
