MINING.

T. K. BRUNER, MANAGER. Hoover Hill is taking out some very rich ore from the Gallimore shaft. The Crowell mine is still at work sinking their main shaft.

The Welborn mine, in Davidson county will be at work shortly by an English company.

The Jones mine, near Asheboro, is nearly ready for operation, having a large amount of ore on dumps for milling. When their copper plates are placed in position they will commence milling.

We have reliable information from parties here that Col. Cochran, L. W. Sears, and others of the Gold Hill Company, will be here in June and start up working at Gold Hill, and will also erect a furnace for their concentrated ore that will be smelted on the ground to regulus or matt.

The Key Stone (nee Jones), in Randolph county, are working their extensive mill, and are making practical working tests of several tons of ore from all parts of their property, preparatory to working on an extensive scale with a new desulphurizer.
