One of the causes of the New York flurry is said to have been that money was too plentiful. The banks had their coffers full and did not know how to invest it. In order to utilize their funds they lent money on stocks at low rate on call. Men who never hypothecated a security with brokers were thus induced to change the nature of their loans from time to call, depositing stocks with the banks as collatterals. When the stocks began to depreciate rapidly the leans were called. The owners could not sell on the weak market without heavy less. They therefore had to borrow again on call-and money on call ran up to 3 per cent a day, equal to 1,000 per cent a year! That was interesting to the parties concerned and shows where much of the real weakness lay.
