ROAD-MAKING AND NEW LAW ARE NEEDED.

An Interesting and Suggestive Letter on the Crying Need of the Time in North Carolina.

From the Raleigh Chronicle. The charge of Judge Gudger to the Grand Jury, in regard to the negligent performance of duty by the overseers of roads, was all very well, but it would have been more to the purpose if he had called attention to the omission of the Legislatures, in this regard, for a hundred years and more. Under the present laws, an intelligent and energetic road overseer may do something to render our higways tolerable; but no amount of energy can make the roads more than passable with the resources at hand in bad weather.

The thing to be done is to impose taxes for the making of roads. The property holders ought to bear ninetenth of the burden, because they would reap nine-tenths of the benefit. A poor man, that is to say, a man who owns no land, houses, horses, or wagons, has only indirect interest in good roads. He is only interested by their tendency to increase trade and industry by which wages would be increased. But the man of means has the great advantage arising from increasing and prospering

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


