

Horrid Crime.

The murder of Miss Lizzie Turlington by her lover, Walter L. Bingham, (of which an account was published in last week's) is without a parallel in North Carolina. She was murdered for no offense whatever, only for declining to marry him instantly. She had entered into an engagement for services in the deaf and dumb institution, and had promised the superintendent to remain there until May, and assist in teaching the young lady who was to take her place in the institution, after which time, as she told that officer, she expected to marry Mr. Bingham. This engagement cost her her life. She refused marriage until she had filled it, and so far as is known, Bingham had no other cause for displeasure. That she still confided in him as her future husband, was evidenced by her going off with him in a buggy. But he it was who was playing false. He lured her off into the woods, under false pretences, and basely, cruelly, murdered the innocent girl who was fondly looking forward to and preparing to become his wife.

Death of Senator Logan.

Another great man has fallen. Senator Logan was taken sick three weeks ago, complaining of rheumatism in the right wrist, which extended up the arm to the shoulder, and then in the hips and lower extremities. This yielded to treatment; but taking fresh cold brought on a complication of troubles, the most important of which was an affection of the brain, causing his mind to wander, especially during the night. His friends became apprised of the fact that his case was a critical one, and many of them gathered about his house. He died in the afternoon of the 28th, after unconsciousness from 2 a.m., surrounded by the members of his family and numerous friends.

It is said that the General complained a good deal through the fall, and often said to his wife that he was breaking down. He thought the publishers were dealing unfairly with him, and it caused more unrest and anxiety than he could bear up under. He was nearly 61 years old.

Mr. Logan has filled many high and responsible public trusts. He served in the Mexican war, came home to Illinois and was elected a clerk of the Court; studied law and was elected solicitor; was elected to the Legislature several times; and in 1850, at the age of 30 years, was elected to Congress, in which he served at different times in both Houses. He was sometimes very bitter against the South, and left his seat in Congress to join the armies of the North in the late war. He was at the battle of Bull Run, and there realized that the North would have to increase her power to crush the "rebellion," and went to southern Illinois to rally the unionists and raise a regiment of which he was elected Colonel. He was an active, vigorous, and generally successful man, and his death will be lamented as a public loss.

\$400 Reward.

Gov. Scales has offered a reward of \$400 for the arrest of Walter L. Bingham, the deaf mute murderer of Miss Lizzie Turlington, on Friday, Dec. 17, near Cary, in Wake county. Bingham is six feet in height, of dark complexion, has a deformed or broken nose, is well educated and intelligent. He pretended to be insane in New York, and may do so elsewhere.

The State Auditor in his report recently published, adverts to the report of the State Treasurer wherein estimates have been made of future expenditures, and intimates that it may be possible to reduce rates of taxation. He shows total receipts for the year ending 30th Nov. from all sources of \$385,421.03; and total disbursements of \$1,172,652.31—subject to deductions on various special items amounting to \$492,070.34, to show the legitimate disbursements payable out of the ordinary resources.

Taking up ashes in a wooden box and setting the box under the house, or against a fence or wooden wall, is one of the surest ways of accidentally starting a big fire. Dr. Hume, of Chapel Hill, lost his kitchen and dwelling on Christmas, in this way. The dwelling was a landmark in the town, having been the residence of distinguished persons resident there for 75 years back.

Christmas at Statesville, was not so fortunate; it began well enough, but would up in a row, some cracked heads and a fire. In the latter, L. Sharpe and Capt. Winslow were the losers, one of buildings and the other of a quantity of tobacco, but covered by insurance.

The citizens of Cleveland O. did the right thing on Christmas—they caused to be distributed to the poor of the city 2,600 baskets, each containing a turkey, a peck of potatoes, half a pound of butter and a two pound loaf of bread, with a Christmas card attached to each basket with directions for cooking.

One would suppose it would be the easiest thing in the world to push ships and boats lying in the water out of the reach of fire, and yet it is no uncommon thing for half a dozen vessels to be destroyed before they can be got away from a burning boat. This happened on the 28th at Cairo, Illinois.

It is announced that some ex-Congressmen will be allowed a place in the funeral ceremonies of Senator Logan. What, as worthy of special favor, or as an example of great goodness?
