Washington, April 24 .- Captain J. M. Levey of the Post-Office Department has been fasting for four weeks, and expects to make up forty days and forty nights abstainance from all tood. He takes no more than a pint and a half of water a day This, with the three teaspoonfuls of certain elixir, is all the nourishment received by him. For the first week he partook of the juice of one or two oranges per day, but this he has given up. He attends to all his duties in the department, appears to be as strong as before he began fasting, and in general health he is greatly improved. He has lost about ten inches in girth and about thirty five pounds in weight. He sleeps well, and the asthmatic trouble with which he suffered greatly before he began to fast is nearly gone.

THE CYCLONE.

Clarksville, Ark., April 23 .- A terrible evelone passed over this country from west to east from two to three miles wide, at 7 o'clock vesterday morning, passing north of Clarksville, and doing fearful damages. The following persons were killed: Mrs. P. L. Turner, a child of J. M. Ried, a grown daughter of G. D. Rowley, a child of Mr. Rutter, a two year old child. The following were badly wounded by falling houses and flying timbers: P. M. Turner and two children, Mr. Stovall and wife, J. D. Rowley and wife, Mrs. W. P. Blackburn and some children, Frank Morgan and one of his children, several members of Simon Wises family. The houses of all these parties were blown down and scattered far and near. Twenty-six farmers in this vicinity hesi les those mentioned lost their houses, barns and fences, which were blown away and destroyed. Considerable stock was killed and many families will suffer if not aided at once.

A FATAL MISTAKE. THE Cleveland (Ohio) Press, of February 23d, 1883, published an account of a fatal surgical operation which caused a great commotion among medical men throughout the whole country, Dr. Thayer, the most eminent surgeon in Cleveland, pronouncing it scandalous. It appears that a Mrs. King had been suffering for many years from some disease of the stomach, which had resisted the treatment of all the physicians in attendance. The disease

commenced with a slight derangement of the digestion, with a poor appetite, followed by a peculiar indescribable distress in the stomach, a feeling that has been described as a faint "all gone" sensation, a sticky slime collecting about the teeth, causing a disagreeable taste. This sensation was not removed by food, but, on the contrary, it was increased. After a while the hands and feet became cold and sticky a cold perspiration.
