| From this it appears that the South Ward has the most peeple, while the West Ward has the least. The South Wurd also has the largest number of white people as well as of colored peopie. while the North Ward has the east whites and the West Ward the fewest blacks. <br> The females outnumber the males by 141. The South Ward heads the list in both columns, while the West Ward is on the bottom. <br> The whites outnumber the colored 521 ; a little over 56 per cent. of our people are white and a little-less than 44 per cent. are colored. <br> The ceacus was taken accurately and pains were taken to omit none. Every square had its enumerator, and on the edge of the town where the squares were not clearly defined an enumerator was appointed for a neighborhood. In regard to age, our enumerators found some difficulty, but the exact school age has been ascertained, and of the adults we have 127 people between 00 and 70 years of age, of which 82 are white and 45 colored. We have 40 people over 70 years of age, of which 19 are colorel and 27 are white. <br> This shows that we are not in the retrograde and that we are a coporation of no small dimensions.
