A Desperate Negro Killed.
 A negro man, named Green Horn, near China Grove, Monday night, and attempted to break into the house. The family were all in bed, but Mr. Kirk hearing him at the window jumped out of bed and went to the window. He saw the man and ordered him off. Mr. Kirk then went out with his rifle (unloaded) and raised it on him. But the negro begged, "Don't shoot, don't shoot," and went off towards the road. Mr. Kirk stood watching his movements. The fellow stopped, turned back towards the house and Mr. Kirk stepped into the house to load his gun, but in the confusion of the moment, lost the ball and had no other. The negro came back with evident intent to accomplish his wicked design. Mr. Kirk met him on the piazza with the empty rifle in his hand and warned him off, but the negro sprang towards him and was met by a terrible blow on the temple with the gun which killed him dead upon the spot. He lay where he fell, with one foot on the door-step and one hand in his pocket grasping a large knife, until visited by Coroner Atwell next day. The facts as related above were given by Mr. Kirk and corroborated by other members of his family, who heard all that passed between the men. The negro had a full flask of whiskey in his pocket and had left a sealed jug and his valise at the big road, a hundred yards from the house. He wore a blue cloth coat, and had in his valise a pair of pants, a blue cloth vest and a pair of new shoes. It is not known whether he was drunk or sober.

The Steamer Haytien Republique Surrendered.
 HAVANNA, Dec. 22.—Advices have been received from Hayti to the effect that the dispute over the seizure of the American Steamer Haytien Republic, has been settled. The steamer has been delivered to the American man-of-war, and the latter have honored the Haytien flag with a salute of twenty-one guns. Among the people the action of the United States Government is considered an abuse of power against a helpless nation, and this opinion is said to be shared by some of the diplomatic representatives. General Legation has been unanimously elected President of the Republic and is taking energetic steps to repress revolutions.

Burned Their Way Out.
 HOPKINSVILLE, Ky., Dec. 25.—Two colored prisoners confined in the jail at Dawson when their escape Sunday night by setting fire to their cells. The building was in flames and the inmates crying for help when the jailer unlocked their cell doors. They were badly scorched, and would have perished in the flames in a minute more when released, and as there was no one to guard them they escaped.

Election Betters to be Indicted.
 MONTELUCA, Ill., Dec. 25.—Judge Hughes has instructed the grand jury of Coles county to bring indictments against every one who had bets on the election, Dec. 6, at Republican or Prohibition, and to summon all candidates who ran for office before the grand jury.

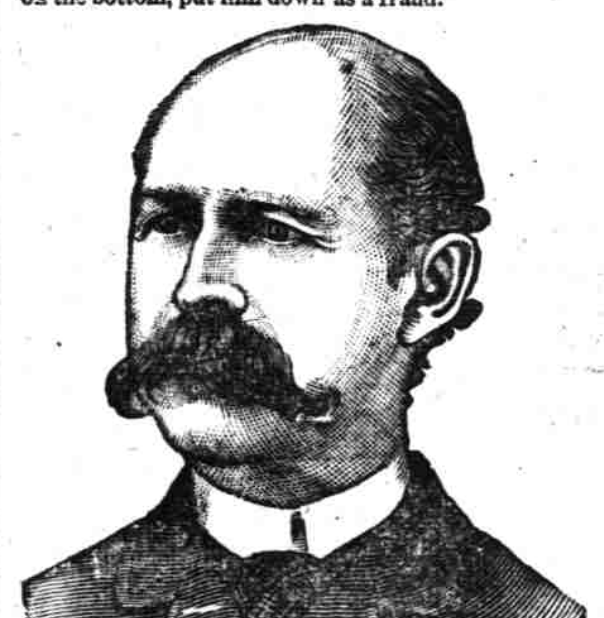
