How the Whiskey Business Thrives  
Correspondence of the Watchman.

I will attempt to give you a few dots from this part of the mountains. After much rain, mud and cold we are glad to hail the beautiful sunshine. Wheat is fruit in this section. I think the fruit, peaches especially, was damaged by the late frost. There is a revival in progress at the Baptist church, which is resulting in a great deal of good. There has been much of a stir, but the Lord has made himself manifest in the conversion of three or four, and the church is being much revived. The church that Rev. R. L. Patterson serves will always be in a good condition. We are sorry that Professor Patterson has left the school room. He is one of the best educators in North Carolina, but he feels it his duty to preach all the time. Previous to this he has been preaching and teaching. We had a lecture this morning by a Mr. Stukenthorpe on temperance reform. He gave many fine illustrations in the subject, and organized a prohibition club. I think that if any county in the State needs such a party it is needed here in the mountains. A man passing through this place this week asked a doctor if he ever knew of a man in Wilkes to kill himself by drinking. The doctor said he did not know of any one, and the man said he thought that the statement was true for, said he, I could take any man in Wilkes and make a still-kill out of him. He said that all the men of Wilkes that drank must have copper bottoms. The Alliance of this county are not doing what they might. I think we need some missionary work in this section. **Soaked in Blood.**  
New York, April 22, 1891.—A part of the mail of the train wrecked on the Michigan Southern road, near Norfolk, O., in which collision on Saturday six mail clerks were killed, reached this city yesterday. The majority of the newspapers were completely soaked with blood. In the past ten years forty-three mail clerks have been killed in the service and 470 injured. The mail cars are always placed forward, and in a collision the clerks who are usually busy sorting mail, have no warning of their impending fate. Efforts have been made to have the salary of a clerk killed in the services extended for at least a year after his death or to have his family allowed a pension, but all such efforts have failed.

**Scientific and Industrial.**  
Gas is made from petroleum. The cutting of veneers is now done by electricity. Siam is to have a \$400,000 electric railway thirty miles long. California is the only State in the union which at present produces quicksilver in commercial quantities. A commercial expert of Cincinnati, Ohio, Bradford McGregor by name, has succeeded, it is stated, in uniting aluminum with glass. Silk from paper pulp is made smooth and brilliant, has about the same elasticity as ordinary silk and is about two-thirds as strong. Geologists have proved that the diamond mines of South Africa are situated in veins or chimneys varying from seventy to \$5,000 feet in diameter. There is a growing interest in electric lighting plants owned and operated by cities in England. The city of Cambridge is about to build a plant which will cost \$175,000. The hobbin and shuttle manufacturers of this country are about to consolidate their interests and business, probably by organization of a new corporation in which all will be stockholders.
