Something to think about.

According to the New England Farmer the gross cash income per cow for the animals contributing to the connection comprises the past year was \$45 20. Why would not that be a nice little sum for some of our farmers to realize with making manure from the cows to enrich the soil for other crops? It is certain that in keeping 5 lbs of the Conn. cows we can save an average of 100 lbs of cotton seed in freight charges on cotton seed meal and corn meal. Ensilage, too, on the rugged New England hillsides costs more to produce and has higher cash value than similar articles here. Where we can count on an average of 100 lbs of cotton seed meal and cotton seed hulk make them cheap when other articles are scarce.

We can make ensilage cheaper than the Northern farmer because of less expense to keep cold out, and cheaper labor, to put corn in as well as less cost for lumber to build a silo. They who try not about a little toward reaching an income from our cows in cash?—Frank E. Emery, Agricultural N. C. Experiment Station.

Sub-Treasury Plan.

Additional machinery is to be put in the works of the Fayetteville Wood-working Company at Fayetteville.

A wood-working factory is to be established by the Forest City Manufacturing company, of Forest City.
