Last Friday at 5:20 p. m., the first passenger train ever run to Norwood left Salisbury with a crowd of good looking people aboard.

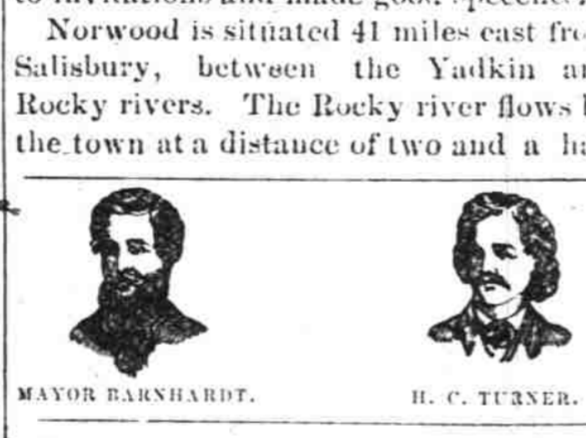

LIVERY STABLE. There has been no regular livery business in Norwood. Mr. M. E. Blalock has been keeping accommodations in that line.

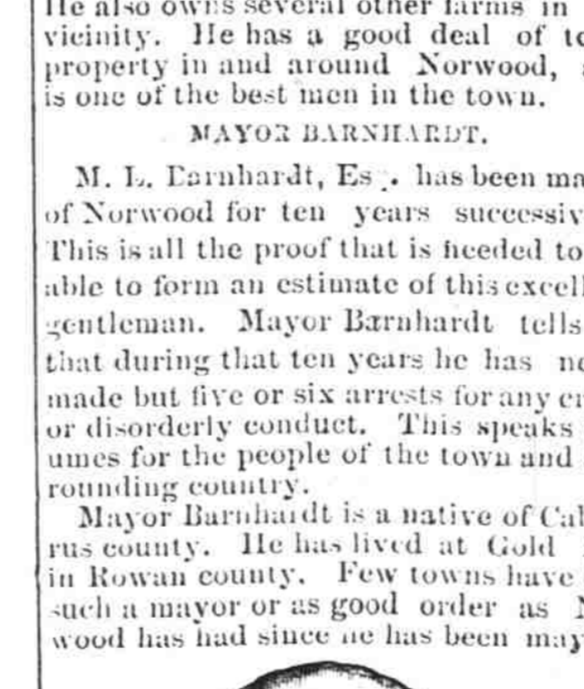
CHURCHES. Norwood has no resident pastors, but has three churches. Services are held in each church once a month.
