## To be Elected by the People.

The Senate Committee has been giving hearings to those who favor the proposed amendment to the const.tution requiring Senators to be elected by the people. Among the measures is one that the equality of the States in the Senate Le abolished and that one Senator shall be allowed for every million of inhabitants.

There is now one representative to two hundred thousand people; and a Senator would on that schedule just be five times important as a Congressman. Various reasons are given by those who advocate the change; the most important being that corporations influence the elections of Senators by the Legislature. Senators are now generally selected by a party caucus. Were they voted for at the polls, they would be selected by the State conventions of the parties. The main question then which is the best system -to have the choice committed to the State conventions, or to let the representatives of the party in the legislature select .- News-Observer.

The postage stamp will be fifty-two years old in May. Its inventor was a printer, James Chalmers, of Dundee, Scotland, who died in 1853. England, fifty-two years ago, introduced the new system of prepaying letter postage, and according to a decree of Dec. 21, 1839 issued the first stamps, which were to be put before the public on May 6tl of the following year. A year later they were introduced in the United States and Switzerland, and within three years had become common in Bavaria, Belgium and France. - Charleston News and Courier.

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
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
