The following is a correct copy of the platform adopted at St. Louis by the labor conference;

FINANCE.

1. We demand a national currency the gen_ral government only; a full leg il tender for all debts, public and private; and without the use of bankfing corporations; a just and equitable means of circulation, at a tax not to exceed two per cent, as set forth in the sub-treasury plan of the Farmers' Alliance, or some better system; also, by payments in the discharge of its obligations for public improvements. a. We demand free and unlimited

coinage of silver. b. We demand the amount of cir-

culating medium to be speedily increased to not less than \$50 per capita. c. We demand a graduated income d. We believe that the money of the treasury should be kept as much as

possible in the hands of the people

and hence we demand all National and

State revenues shall be limited to the necessary expenses of covernment peonomically and honestly administered e. We demand that Postal Saving banks be established by the govern-

ment for the safe deposit of earnings of the people and facilite exchange.

2. Your sub-committee upon the land plank, beg to submit to your ap proval the following: The land, in cluding all natural resources of wealth is the heritage of all people, and should not be monopolized for speculative purposes, and alien ownership of land should be prohibited. All lands now held by railroads and other coparations in excess of their actual needs and all Presbyterians, Baptists, - Methodists, lands now owned by aliens should be Pslampingers and such like, but the reclaimed by the Government and held only way we could distinguish them for actual settlers only.

TRANSPORTATION

3. Transportation being a means of defence and public necessity, the Government should own and operate roads in the interest of the people.



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
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
