

2. Your sub-committee upon the land plank, beg to submit to your ap. provid the following; The land, including all natural resources of wealth, is the heritage of all people, and should not be monopolized for speculative purposes, and alien ownership of land should be prohibited. All lands nov neld by railroads and other coporation in excess of their actual needs and al lands now owned by aliens should be reclaimed by the Government and held for actual settlers only.

TRANSPORTATION

3. Transportation being a means of defence and public necessity, the Government should own and operate roads in the interest of the people. a. The telegraph and telephone. like the postal system, being a necessity for the transmission of news, should be owned and operated by the government in the interest of the people.

While some parts of the above address may seem at a mere glance to make partisan political distinctions. yet upon careful study one will clearly see that it is non-partisan, and further. will be impressed with the truth of its promises, and the ability of the committee who framed it. It was adopted with only a few di-senting votes, and the platform was adopted unanimously. and received with great applause. The conference having completed its work as a representative body, and adjourned sine die.


