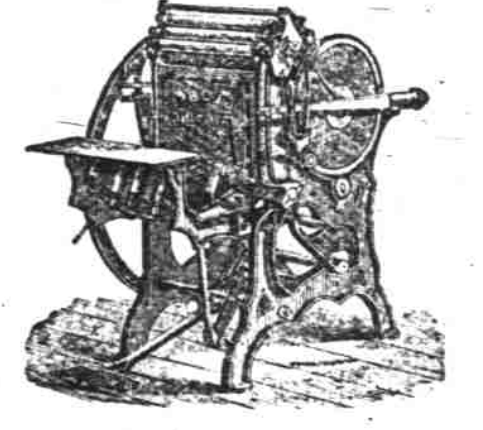

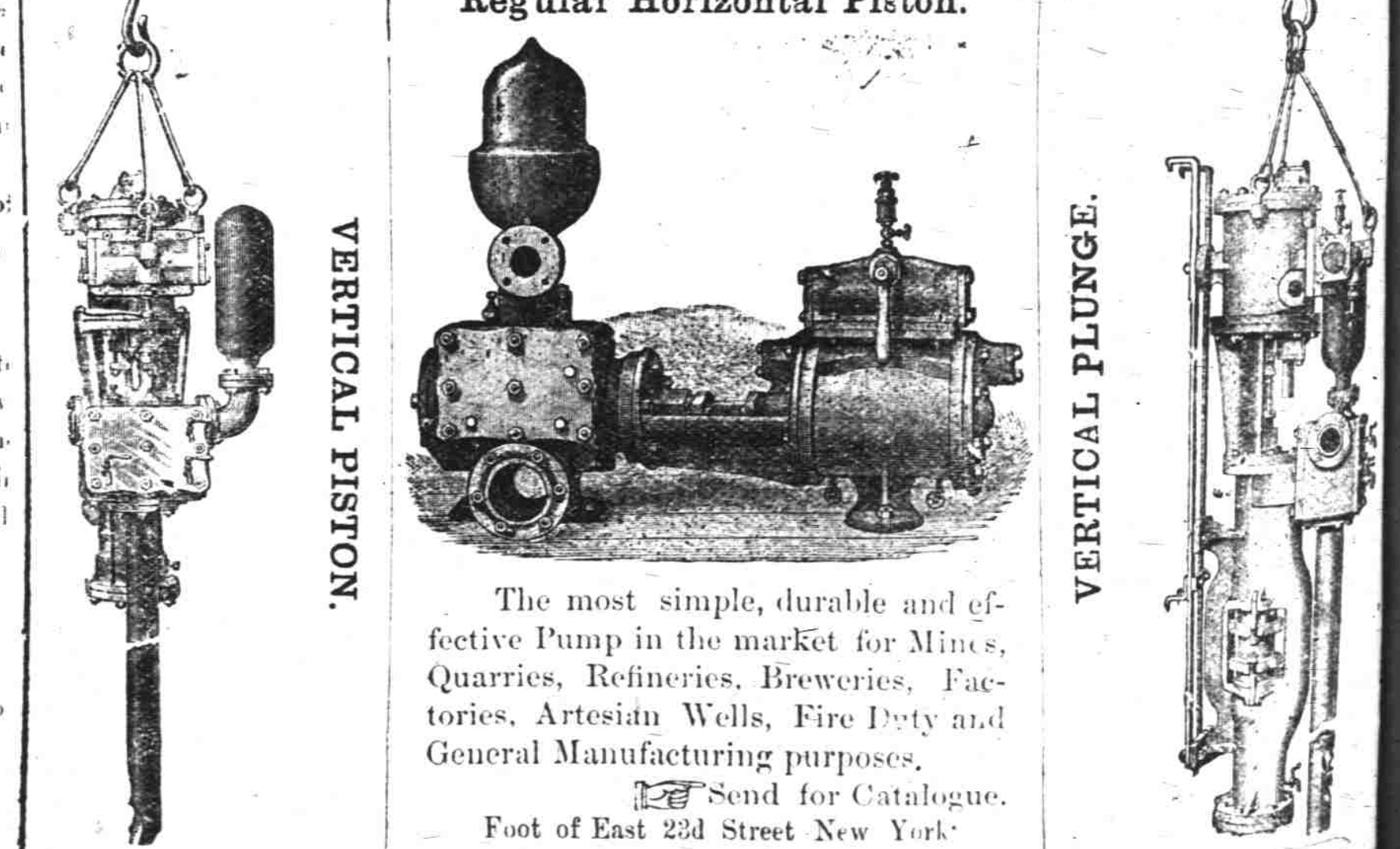

GENERAL NEWS.

The Cholera Raging Washington, July 24.—Assistant Surgeon G. B. Young, of the Marine Hospital Service, stationed at Naples, Italy, today cabled Surgeon General Wyman that the cholera continues at that place averaging three cases daily.

A Life Term Convict Tried for Murder. Jackson, Miss., July 25.—Henry Singleton, who murdered Lulu Payne in the penitentiary a few days ago, has been indicted for murder. He will be tried at the present term of court if his condition will permit it.

Consumption Curable. CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., July 25.—The Board of Health reports to the Times of this city, through City Physician Holland, that each of the eleven third-stage consumptives placed under the treatment obtained from Dr. Anjick of Cincinnati, by the city authorities several weeks ago have improved to a degree almost miraculous.

Mr. Taylor became very much excited, turned very red in the face and fell down and died before he could be carried home, about two miles from the church.

CHICAGO, July 29.—The World's Fair will be open next Sunday. This decision was reached last night at a meeting of the council of administration when a long set of resolutions was adopted reciting the proceedings in the Flagman injunction suit, and finally ordering that "the World's Columbian Exposition and the gates thereof shall be opened to the public on Sunday next, in the same manner and on like terms and conditions that have prevailed prior to the said order of the court, and it is further ordered that certified copies of this order be transmitted to the general director and superintendent of the admissions, with instructions to observe and enforce the same." Next week it is hoped that the matter will be definitely and finally settled and the public will know whether to count upon a six or seven day fair.

Work has been suspended on the North and Western Railroad from Egypt to Asheboro.

Judge Connor presiding over Cumberland Superior Court has sentenced the two Fayetteville safe breakers to ten years each in the penitentiary.

Under the provisions of the late A. J. Drexel's will giving his clerks \$100 for every year they had been with him, one of them will receive over \$3,000.

Over two hundred African converted in Uganda and the regions about have suffered death rather than give up their faith in Christ.

Gov. Markham, of California, has appointed Geo. C. Perkins United States Senator to fill out the unexpired term of the late deceased Senator Sanford.

V. C. Perry has assumed editorial charge of the Spirit of the South, at Rockingham, N. C. The paper will have no political opinions, which means that it will be watching.

State Auditor Furman says that the State pension fund this year will be a little over \$100,000. There are many new applications. There will be an entirely new apportionment of pensions among the four classes.

Georgia's melon crop this year is estimated to be worth nearly a quarter of a million dollars to the farmers and perhaps a hundred thousand dollars to the railroads in the State. The State's crop will run up to 8,000 car loads, it is said, and at \$60 a car the farmers will get almost a quarter of a million dollars.

DENVER, Col., July 26.—Thirty-five hundred hungry people were fed with bread, meat and milk this morning by the missions. The list of idle men is increasing as the miners come in from the camps. It had been planned by the unemployed men that 1,000 of them should march to the Governor's office this morning and demand freetransportation east, but they were dissuaded from doing so by the efforts of Rev. Myron Reed and Thomas Uzzell. A train load of men will be shipped eastward to-night.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 26.—John Somme killed his wife and two children sometime between 11 and 2 o'clock last night and then attempted to cover his crime by setting the house on fire. Firemen soon extinguished the flames and discovered the dead bodies—the wife with her head crushed by a hammer and the children smothered. A boy 8 years old and an infant 11 weeks old were fastened in the building by their father, but the arrival of the fireman saved them. The rescue boy says his father killed his mother and other two children. The room showed evidence of a desperate fight for her life by Mrs. Somme. Somme is in jail.

Rev. A. D. L. Moser died at his home in this city yesterday morning after a long illness, aged 55 years. Deceased was a Lutheran, having formerly served a charge at Enochville and other points in the State, but of late years he has been compelled, on account of ill-health and age, to retire from the ministry. He was a devoutly pious man, and in his day an able speaker. He leaves a wife and son in very destitute circumstances. The funeral services will be conducted this morning at 10 o'clock from St. Mark's church by Rev. Dr. Bowman.—Charlotte Observer.

To keep silver ware bright without constant rubbing, which is injurious to plated articles, dissolve a small handful of borax in a pan of hot water, with a little soap; put the silver in and let it remain for an hour or so, then pour off the suds, rinse with clear, cold water and wipe with a soft cloth.

The Republican says that Pastor Targett, of Centenary M. E. church, Winston, has given out that he intends to church those of his members who don't stop dancing, drinking whiskey and playing cards.

The deputy collector for Fredell has prepared about 40 bonds for brandy distillers, and, the Landmark says, has about that many more in sight. This means that 80 brandy distilleries will be in operation in that county this year.

The Sun says the frescoing of the interior of Trinity Methodist church, of Durham, done by the Montalones, of Baltimore, and for which they received over \$1,000, is a perfect job. It is falling off and all the work will have to be done over.

Mr. I. W. Clark, master mechanic for the Cape Fear Yachting Valley shops, has a child of remarkable physical development. Scarcely three years old, it nevertheless weighs 50 pounds, wears a No. 6 1/2 hat and No. 9 shoes.

He will distribute these medals among a number of colleges, and will leave their award to the professor of the colleges.

The Wilmington Star: Some of the Republican organs are asserting that the South is suffering from Democratic rule at Washington because there were not so many cotton factories built in the first six months of last year. But these esteemed organs entirely overlook the fact of the financial stringency from which the country has suffered in the past six months as the result of republican folly and criminality.

The date for the re-union at Concord of the survivors of Company F, First North Carolina Cavalry, Confederate army, is August 15th, instead of August 1st, as heretofore published. The hour is 10:30 o'clock and after the re-union meeting the company will take dinner at the St. Cloud hotel.

A special received at Raleigh from Roxboro, in Person county, says that Mormon missionaries are at work in that county, and that they are visiting and distributing tracts among the poor. They have announced a mass meeting to be held on the 30th of this month, when it is thought they hope to make a number of converts.

The Caucasian says that when the State Guards were passing through Goldsboro on their way to and from Morehead City, and while the cars were being shifted, the "soldiers" pilaged the watermelon patch of Mr. Tom Snipes and robbed it of nearly very ripe melon. The act is denounced, as it deserves to be if the facts are as stated.

News is received here that ex-Sheriff A. R. Lakey, of Yadkin county, who was reported short in his tax collection, was made an assignment a few days ago to A. E. Holton and David Shore. His bondsmen met in Yadkinville and set up the deficiency in the ex-sheriff's taxes. It is said that his property, which he turned over to his bondsmen, will more than pay all his indebtedness.—Winston Sentinel.

The Courier says a Roxboro drayman accidentally dropped his watch into a well which had 14 feet of water in it. He was unable to get it out and a little darkey agreed to recover it for him for 75 cents. A bargain was struck, the darkey dived three times and the third time brought up the watch; but the people of the town don't want any more water out of that well for drinking purposes.

The Shelby Aurora of last week sent into a theological discussion and undertook to prove from the Bible and its intellect that there is no perfection here. Evangelists Cook and Quattle were holding a meeting in a tent at Shelby, and Brother Cook held the Bible in one hand and the Aurora in the other and denounced the latter as "a rotten sheet." Said he hadn't sined himself for eleven years. Editor Miller waited on him and he at first denied the language and afterward promised in the presence of witnesses to retract it; but he left without retracting, and the editor is still of this opinion.

ASHEVILLE July 19.—The postoffice at Alexander was burglarized Thursday night. The thieves got \$200 cash and \$28 in stamps besides a lot of jewelry. There is no clue to the identity of the thieves.

A wind and rain storm of unusual severity passed through this section Saturday evening, doing considerable damage to timber and buildings. Evangelist Fife, who was on his way to Cleveland Springs in a buggy, was caught in the storm on the bridge near town.
