Among the other members of the Wild West Show were Left Hand, the noted Chief of the Pawnees, and a band of his warriors; Gray Eagle, the Chief of his tribe, and some of his braves; Texas Tom, Broncho Bob, Mexican Frank, Oklahoma Al, Mustang Walter, Wyoming Bill, Deadwood Dick, Prairie Queen, Stampede Steve, Trapper Tom, and Bright Star, who is a good-looking Indian princess. It is very interesting and instructive as well. It will delight all who see it at Tolchester, as it has delighted thousands who have seen it elsewhere. To witness it is an education; to miss it one loses an opportunity that may not occur again."
