> The last postal laws are such that newspaper publishers can arrest any one for fraud who takes at paper and refuses to pay for it. Under this law the man who allows his subscription to run along for some time unpaid and then orders the postmaster to mark it "refused" and have a postal card sent notifying the publisher, lays himself liable to arrest and fine the same as for theft, etc.
