County Commissioners Held a Two Day's Session Last Week.

The County Commissioners met Monday, April 8th, in regular and Tuesday, Apr. 11th, in special session. The following men were chosen as tax listers for the various townships: Salisbury, J. M. Brown, L. Ed Heilig, L. M. Kerschener and Jno. B. Kerns; Franklin, J. C. Miller; Unity, N. N. Fleming; Scotch-Irish, Jonathan Lyerly; Cleveland, R. B. Harris; Mt. Ulla, W. D. Graham; Steele, Sam Baker; Atwell, J. C. Deaton; China Grove, Rev. C. B. Miller; Locke, Ed M. Sifferd; Litaker, Jno. A. Sloop; Gold Hill, Z. A. Kluttz; Morgau, J. A. Miller; Providence, Louis A. Kesler.

T. D. Brown, superintendent of the county home, tendered his resignation to take effect at once. He made a proposition that if retained, he be allowed a salary of \$25 monthly with work at present and without care of the farm. Resignation accepted.

R. A. Safrit submitted an oral proposition to take charge of the home and to board inmates at \$10 per head, monthly. Mrs. C. Patterson made a proposition in person to take charge of the home for \$8 monthly, she to work the farm and get proceeds from the same. She also made another offer to put in all the time of herself and husband, to work the farm and donate the proceeds to the county, receiving therefore, \$15 with board for her family of wife, husband and two children, aged 6 and 9 years. Accepted with understanding that she take charge at once and the term to continue at the option of the board.

Mr. Brown thanked the commissioners for courtesies extended and recommended the purchase of a spring wagon, a phone and the burning off of lands to improve pasture.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Whereas T. D. Brown, superintendent of the county home, has tendered his resignation as such, and insisted that his resignation be accepted at once in order that he may move to his own farm and the better care for the same,

Resolved, That the voluntary resignation of T. D. Brown be accepted.

Resolved further, That the board express its appreciation to Mr. Brown for the faithful and efficient manner in which he has looked after affairs of the county home.
