**Store Robbed.**

The store of the Belk-Harry Company was entered by thieves last Thursday night, and a quantity of clothing, shoes, etc., stolen. There were at least two of the thieves, for when the store was opened Friday morning two old and faltered suits of clothing lay on the floor. They carried off a couple of telescopes filled with goods, and one of them was found on Council street Friday morning. There is no clue to the men. Entrance to the store was effected through a back door, with the aid of a crowbar.

**Praise for Morgan and Pettus.**

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 25.—Edmund W. Pettus and John T. Morgan, the two oldest members of the United States Senate, were re-elected today by the unanimous vote of the Alabama legislature, coupled with words of hearty praise of the lives and the services of the two aged Senators. Senator Morgan is now serving his 80th year in the Senate. Senator Pettus' services in the Senate has been comparatively brief, as he was first elected in 1897. On the other hand, he has the distinction of being the oldest member of that body in point of years. He was born in 1821 and will be 86 years old in July.

**Greeks Grossly Mistreated.**

Tampa, Florida, Jan. 25.—Six Greeks, penniless, hungry and footsore, today reported to Inspector A. A. Serappic, of the Department of Commerce and Labor here, that they had walked to Tampa from Charlotte Harbor. The men claim they, with 40 others, were employed in New Hampshire by the Greek-American Labor Bureau of New York, to come to Florida to work on the Charlotte Harbor & Northern Railroad; that they were subjected to hardships, forced to pay 1 cent an ounce for bread and received no pay for 11 days' work. When they struck the company's agents refused them transportation on their boats to Panta Gorda, and they had to walk. Inspector Serappic reported the case to Washington. The men are here as public charges and say others are also on the way on foot. The men have in their possession contracts signed by M. Greenfield, manager of a labor bureau, guaranteeing them \$1.50 per day and other things, none of which, they say, were fulfilled.

**East Spencer Fire.**

On the night of the 22nd a destructive fire occurred in East Spencer. The grocery store of Harkins and Harris was burned with the goods in the store, involving a loss to them of about \$3,000. The building was owned by C. E. Fesperman and his loss was partly covered by insurance, though he too, is a heavy loser. Mr. Fesperman had just sold the building, but had not delivered the deed. A residence adjoining the store, also owned by Mr. Fesperman, took fire and was also destroyed, together with a quantity of furniture and household goods.

**Public Building Site.**

The matter of the site for the government building has been settled. The site selected was that on Inness street, from Harper's stable to the corner of Church street, the two houses on the property being occupied respectively by Dr. J. F. Griffith and Mrs. J. A. Thomason. When it came to making the deed to the government it appears that some of the Heilig heirs objected to signing it. The matter has been settled by the government condemning the property and then selecting the site. It is not known when work on the building will commence.

**Fell by the Wayside.**

Patrolman John Asbury, of the Charlotte force, was in town last Saturday and filled up on liquor. He became well tanked up and he was taken in charge by Officers Eagle and Cauble. On Monday Chief Irwin, of Charlotte, suspended the officer, who resigned later.

**The Double Track Work.**

Most of the double track work on the Southern, between here and Greensboro, has been finished. This refers to the grading, as the rails have been laid on only a comparatively small portion of the new work. It is expected that the grading will be completed about the middle of March.

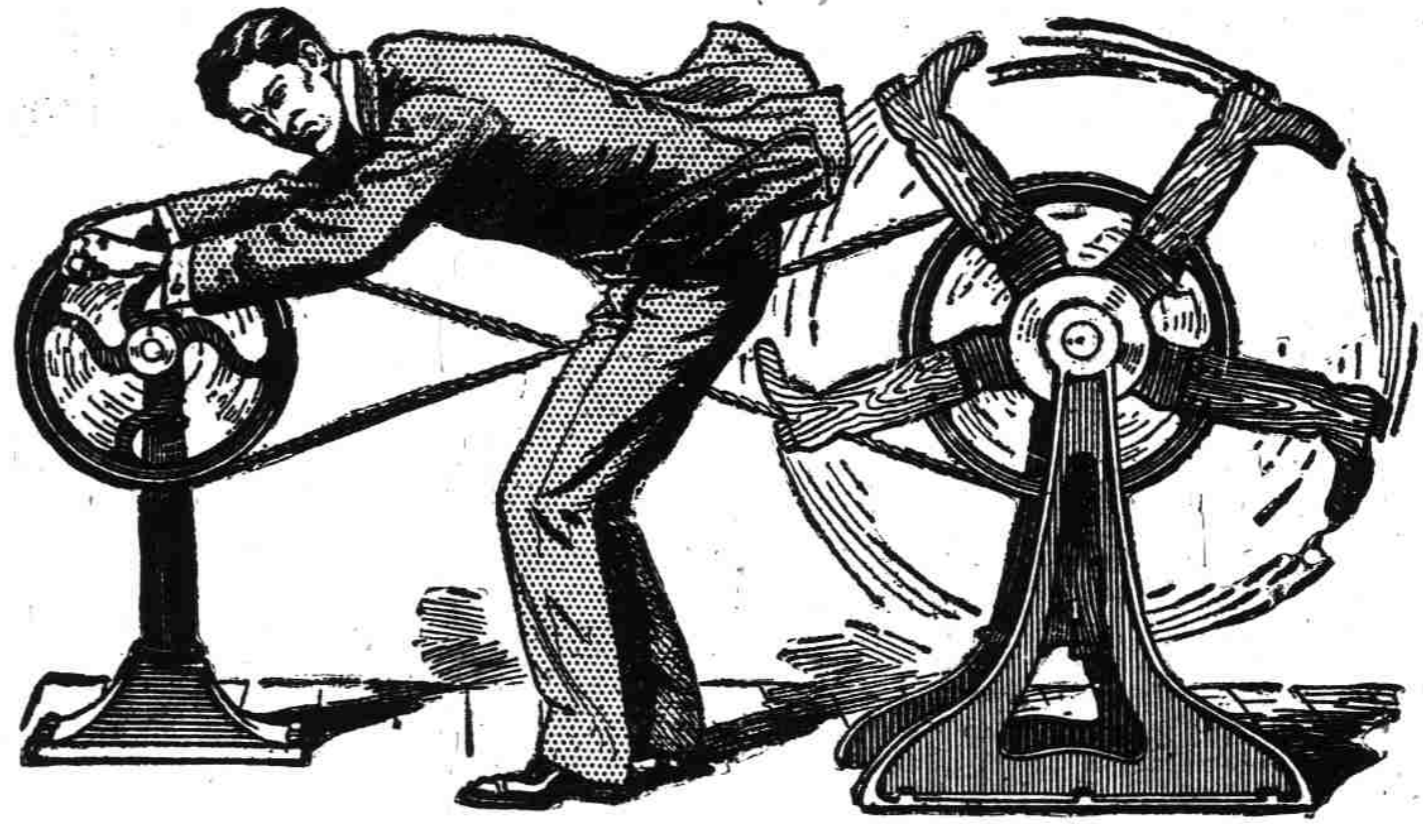
