Paul R. S. Cress visited friends near Lower Stone church, Sunday.

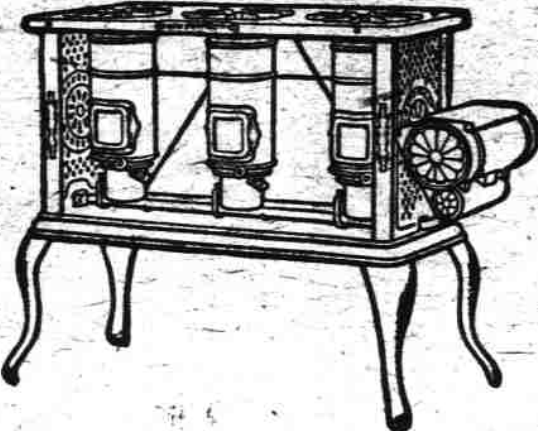
George W. Hill and wife visited Willie Buckwell, Mrs. Hill's brother, last Saturday.
