STATE NEWS.

From All Parts of the State. Items Condensed for Busy Readers.

Alexander A. Blalock, a worthy colored man of Vance county, has invented a cotton barker and chopper which it is claimed will save much labor. It will bar off, chop and replace the dirt taken from the plant all at the same time.
The Episcopal Convention of the Diocese of North Carolina in session at Raleigh passed resolutions condemning the sale of alcoholic liquors except for medicinal purposes.
It is reliably reported that Lexington is to have a new post office building which will cost sixty five thousand dollars. The people of Lexington have been working for more than two years for a new post office.
Eau Gray and Sam Walker, both negroes, had a fight at Belhaven the other day. Gray first stabbed Walker in the breast, notching his breast bone; then he slashed him in the ribs and cut one rib in two, and with the same stroke divided Walker's liver into several parts. Notwithstanding all these wounds Walker chased Gray 400 yards, and then walked back a mile to get a doctor to sew up his wounds. Gray has been captured and is in jail.
The cruiser North Carolina has been placed in commission. It is stated that the presentation of the silver service given by the state will take place at Norfolk instead of at Cape Lookout on account of the dangerous character of the water at the latter place.
The residence of Jno. R. Wood of Concord was totally destroyed by fire last week. The house was in flames when discovered and nothing was saved except a piano and some trunks. The loss is over \$2,000 with \$1,600 insurance.
Governor Glenn was the principal speaker Thursday before the National Resource Conference of Governors at Washington. His subject was the Appalachian White Mountain project, and he argued eloquently for action by Congress that will preserve the forests of the nation.
The inmates of Buncombe county jail have for the last few weeks been very much frightened at night by the appearance of "strange faces at the iron bars." Jailer Mitchell determined to find out if possible just what was causing such fright. He lay down on a cot and awaited the arrival of the "spook." It made its appearance about 11 o'clock. On investigation it was found that a large locust tree and the moon were the cause of it all. The moon shining through the bars had caused fantastic shapes to be thrown against the window.

Ex-Governor Daniel L. Russell died Thursday at his home in Brunswick county, after a long period of ill health. He had been a judge of the Superior Court, had served in the Legislature, served one term in Congress and in 1896 was elected Governor on the fusion ticket. Since his retirement from the Governor's chair he had been practicing law in Wilmington.
Thos. F. Hopkins, of Concord was attracted Wednesday morning about 2 o'clock by the cries of a woman, and when he opened the door a woman pushed her way in followed by a drunken man. Mr. Hopkins tried to persuade the man to leave but with no success. The fellow, who gave his name as Campbell, was trying to take the woman home, and she had become so frightened that she made the outcry stated. Finally the man left, and Mr. Hopkins took his family to A. Viola's and notified the police. Meantime the man went back to the house, broke in the window, and carried several things away. Both the man and woman were arrested, and Campbell was given 14 months on the roads.
Thursday night at Lexington fire was discovered in the retail department of the Everhart Grocery Company and before the flames could be checked the stock and building together were damaged to the extent of \$8,000, the same being fully covered by insurance. The wholesale department is located in the rear of the building, but this was damaged but little.
A statement by the State superintendent of public instruction that in the past five years 1,891 new public school houses have been erected. The value of school has increased to \$4,250,429, nearly quadrupled. Special tax districts increased from 80 to 625. During the past year alone more than 100 local tax districts were established.
Will Harkins, a young man who was recently convicted and sent to the Buncombe county roads for forgery, has been pardoned. He says that he believed that his sentence to the chain gang was the making of him and that when he had served his time he purposed studying for the ministry.
A change has been made in the Davidson commencement programme. Dr. E. A. Alderman, of the University of Virginia, who was to have delivered the address before the two literary societies, was obliged to cancel his engagement. Governor Ausel, of South Carolina, will speak in his place.
