

## OVER THE STATE.

### Honesty of Newsboy Rewarded. Suit Against Aldermen of Fayetteville.

In the state convention last week a little ragged newsboy was given a dollar to get changed by a delegate who bought a paper, and when he came back he couldn't find the delegate. He hunted and hunted and finally appealed to the chairman to help him. The chairman stated the trouble and the delegates raised a whoop and carried the boy to a table, and filled his hat full of money, nearly \$20. The delegates who bought the paper was found and he gave the 95 cents to the boy also.

Robert Buckingham and John Underwood, aldermen in Fayetteville, have been indicted by A. Perry, a fish dealer, who claims that he is forced to sell fish in the new market house which is partly owned by these two men, and he claims that they are breaking the law that forbids aldermen from having anything to do with business connected with the town government.

L. Levy, a Jew at Winston, was returned to the Morganton hospital last week for the third time, he having relapsed into dangerous insanity after two months absence from the asylum.

The case against Adam Noble, a Guilford colored man, charged with burning an empty house of his wife for insurance money, was quashed in court last week, the prosecution deeming it malicious. It was said that some witnesses had been paid money to appear against him.

Cotton mill people in Charlotte held a monster picnic Saturday. A dozen fat hogs and eight beehives were barbecued, 2,200 loaves of bread eaten, 8,000 bananas, six boxes of lemons and two barrels of sugar for lemonade, and 1,500 cigars for the men were furnished. The multitude numbered 8,000.

The Lexington Dispatch thinks the sheriffs are not as active as they might be in enforcing the Watts law throughout the state, citing only a few who had specially good records along this line. The Dispatch is no doubt correct. The average sheriff has not fully recognized his duty and practically none of the citizens of the state.—Concord Tribune.

Eller, of Winston, may be elected. He was a warm kitchen man and the candidate selects the chairman somewhat. Eller managed Glenn's campaign when he ran for the nomination four years ago.

## THE DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

Continued from page one.

We denounce the Republican party for its wild extravagance during the last session of Congress. In the last five months the Republican Congress spent \$1,200,000,000 of the people's money, levying a tax of \$18 per annum on every man, woman and child in the United States, equal to a tax of \$65 per annum on every burdened tax payer. We do not wonder, therefore, at the present deficit of \$80,000,000 in the treasury, and the expected deficit of \$180,000,000 at the end of next fiscal year. The Republican billion dollar Congress of 1890 produced a Democratic victory in 1892; the Republican billion dollar session of the present Congress means the triumphant election of a Democratic President in the coming election.

### MONEY TO 'PET BANKS.'

We condemn the Republican administration for turning over millions of dollars of the public money to its pet banks in New York city, which thereby depleted the public treasury to such an extent it became necessary for the Republican administration to issue bonds and borrow money to meet the daily obligations of the Federal government.

### STATE'S RIGHTS.

We condemn the Republican party for its failure in the last Congress to enact a law forbidding one inferior judge to suspend the operation of a State law without notice of hearing.

We declare our inflexible opposition to the methods of expanding Federal power at the expense of the just power of the State and we especially denounce the bold and revolutionary threat, that the omission of the States to pass laws upon subjects within their constitutional powers, may be treated as a surrender of these powers into the hands of the Federal government, which may then lawfully proceed as if such powers were possessed by it under the constitution.

### REPUBLICANS FOR NO REFORM.

Though promising reforms demanded by the people, the Republicans in their national convention, at the request of favored interests, voted down every plank, looking to reforms, and relief of the people, or for curbing the power of the trusts. That convention, controlled by Federal officeholders, after nominating for President a life-long officeholder, who was never elected by the people to any office, adopted a platform that on every important measure, straddles, or gives promise to the ear only to break it to the hope, and completed its work by nominating, to the tune of "Marching Through Georgia," a candidate for Vice-President who has led in throttling every reform measure offered in the last session to meet the pressing need of the preservation of our natural resources, opening water-ways, and preventing the destruction of our forests.

We have faith in the patriotism of our people, and in the ultimate development of the natural resources of the State and we call upon all North Carolinians to unite in a common effort to restore prosperity, to re-establish confidence, to forget factional differences, and to cultivate peace and good will among men.

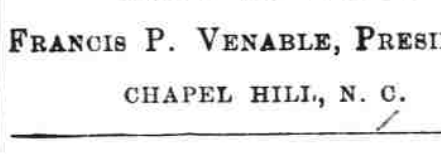

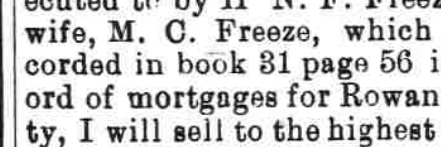
