## LATEST ELECTION RETURNS.

### BRYAN SEEMS TO BE DEFEATED. ALSO HACKETT.

Returns Coming in Slowly in and Mostly of an Unsatisfactory Nature. Democratic State Ticket Elected by About the Usual Majority.

The following reports have been kindly furnished by the Southern Bell Telephone Co., which received them till a late hour last night and this morning, to which company we are very appreciative and under many obligations, especially do we refer to the kindness and courtesies shown us by the local manager, S. H. Wiley. These reports are edited and served in short paragraphs just as received with little effort, which seems useless, to clarify the situation.

Republican National Committee telegraph Mr. Taft that Utah gives him 25,000 majority.

Returns from Eighth Congressional District indicate Hackett's re-election by 50 majority.

Idaho reports 80,000 majority for Taft. Elected entire State Republican ticket.

Montana gives \$30,000 majority for Taft.

650 out of 8,245 districts in Indiana indicate plurality of 16,000 for Taft. Estimate based on returns from 16 counties out of 53 gives Taft majority of 32,000.

1,448 districts out of 1,638 in Greater New York give Hughes 226,600, Chandler, 228,938. At this rate Chandler will carry New York by 33,200.

Cabarrus 150 for Cowles. Stanly 50 for Cowles. Watauga 450 for Cowles. Wilkes 1800 for Cowles.

Total 2450 for Cowles.

Hackett 1,400 and three counties to be heard from.

Returns at this time indicate Taft carried Rhode Island by 17,000.

12 districts in Howard county, Miss., give Bryan 1,850 plurality.

Tennessee going Democratic by unusual majority. State ticket (Democratic) also elected. Congressional ticket unchanged.

Senator Scott claims West Virginia for Taft by 85,000.

Vermillion county, Ill., indicates plurality for Taft of 8,000.

249 districts out of 1,000, State of Wisconsin, give Taft plurality of 9,000.

Taft carries Utah by over 25,000 majority.

Randolph Democratic by 750 majority. Chatham county 30 Republican. State has gone 49,000 Democratic.

Oklahoma 85,000 for Bryan plurality.

Correspondent Industrial News from Asheville reports Grant, Republican, beat Crawford, Democrat, in Tenth District.

1,820 districts in Greater New York give Taft 233,443, Bryan 230,225. Mr. Taft has sent the following to Hitchcock: "I am delighted to hear the favorable returns from all parts of the country and I wish to express my gratitude to you for the work done."

Returns to date indicate that Taft's plurality in Massachusetts will be about 120,000.

Taft's majority in Maine 315,000, Vermont 27,000, New Hampshire 20,000.

Indications are that Talbot, Democratic, Second district; Gill, Democratic, Fourth district; Mud, Democratic, Fifth district, and Wolfe, Democratic, Third district, are re-elected to Congress from Maryland.

Returns from 120 districts of Illinois, indicate majority of 25,000 for Taft in that state.

Taft's majority in Ohio 58,000. In New York state Taft is 89,571 ahead of Bryan.

1,442 out of 1,632 districts in Greater New York give Taft 258,152, Bryan 252,355.

Taft carries Camden county, N. J., by 6,500. Entire Republican ticket re-elected.

490 districts in Brooklyn give Hughes 85,652, Chanler 90,574.

Early returns from Noble county, Ohio, give Taft 500 majority.

Bryan announces will have no statement to make to-night.

At 10 p. m. 85 counties out of 98 give Hitchcock 24,000 majority. Randolph county Democratic 420 majority. Wake county 1,250 majority.

Foreythe Democratic by small majority. Davidson Republican by small majority.

510 districts in Mahattan give Taft 81,379; Bryan 98,862. In 1904 a similar number of districts gave Roosevelt 78,803; Parker 10,097.

Cincinnati. Taft says: "It looks like a landslide. I can take a short nap."

69 out of 168 districts in Greater New York give Taft 22,244 over Bryan. At this rate Taft's majority in city will be 8,000.

Returns from 209 out of 322 districts in city of Louisville, Ky., indicate Taft will carry city by 10,000.

480 out of 587 districts in Brooklyn give Taft 96,021; Bryan 77,795.

Des Moines, Ia., complete returns give Taft majority 2,868. Latest estimate for State majority for Taft of 40,000.

Albany, N. Y. Taft carries every city and villages in West Chester county.

Indications point to majority of 75,000 for Taft in New Jersey.

The following telegram just sent to Taft by Tim Woodruff, "Plurality of New York State more than 200,000 exceeding President Roosevelt's majority. You have carried New York city 5,000 to 10,000. Hughes majority will be at least 5,000 to 10,000."

Telegram to Chairman Hitchcock from North Dakota: "Returns indicate 80,000 majority for Taft. Roosevelt's majority in 1904 was 88,000."

President Roosevelt has telegraphed congratulations to Mr. Taft.

Returns from 82 districts city of Chicago indicate that Stephens, Democrat candidate for governor, will carry by 10,000 majority.

1,109 districts out of 1,652 in Greater New York give Taft 206,114; Bryan 208,370. At this rate Taft will carry the city by 8,000.

All 18 Republican congressmen re-elected in Michigan.

360 districts out of 367 in Brooklyn give Hughes 68,087; Chandler 70,862.

Returns from two thirds districts in Brooklyn indicate that Chandler's majority in Kings county will be about 8,800.

Telegrams to Hitchcock from Milwaukee, Wis., says Taft's majority 75,000.

Returns from Minnesota at present time show Johnston to be running ahead of Bryan on equal with Taft.

22 towns out of 168 in Connecticut indicate Taft majority of 40,000 against 38,000 for Roosevelt in 1904. Same towns indicate majority for Republican governor of 16,000 against 20,000 in 1906.

Returns from several Southern States show that Taft has made wonderful gains. Florida alone has given 30,000 more than to Roosevelt four years ago.

210 districts in Baltimore give Taft 80,000 plurality.

New York Times states returns from 615 districts indicate Taft has carried State outside of New York city 175,000 to 200,000 and probably is elected president.

Lincoln, Neb., returns indicate that Bryan has made substantial gains in his on city.

The polls in Philadelphia closed at 7 p. m. New York Herald says there was an unusually heavy vote. Chairman of Republican Committee says Taft's majority in Philadelphia will be enormous.

Hitchcock makes the following statement: "Taft's majority in New York state will exceed 100,000. His election as president is certain."

Cincinnati, O., Thirteenth Congressional district gives Bryan 9,000 majority. This district elected a Republican congressman in 1906 by 400.

Charleston, S. C., has given Bryan a majority of 50,000 (estimated) and elected the entire congressional delegation.

194 districts, city of Chicago, indicates plurality for Taft in city of 80,000 against 110,000 on basis of same districts.

New York Herald says Twenty-eighth district, state of Pennsylvania, elects Wm. H. Graham, Republican. Thirty-first district, Burke re-elected. Thirty-second district, Orchardfield. These three districts in city of Pittsburgh.

Indications are that Taft carries Massachusetts by 65,000.

New York World concedes Taft's election.

State chairman of Illinois wires Hitchcock that Taft carries Illinois.

## ROWAN DEMOCRATS VICTORIOUS.

### A Hard Fight but Ticket Seems to be Elected by Various Majorities.

The Rowan Democrats had a close call for their political existence yesterday. This was due to internal dissensions, the disaffected prohibitionists, the disloyalty to the party's nominees, and the lack of organization, while on the other hand the Republicans seemed to be well organized, worked hard, and with the aid of the disgruntled, anti-prohibition Democrats and plenty of whiskey, were enabled to do more than has been their custom and, it might be said more than they may expect to do again for some time. However, the Democracy came out victorious with the full county and State tickets to her credit.

After strenuous efforts to get a full report of the vote for the various county offices, we are forced to go to press without it, as the official returns will not be brought in and turned over to the clerk of court until to-morrow, too late for this issue. As the fight was made against Mr. McKenzie, Democratic candidate for sheriff, we have secured the amount of his majority, which is 184. This is a considerable reduction of the vote of two years ago, but does not seem to apply to the sheriff at large, and just whether Mr. McKenzie's vote is the smallest vote or not, is not now apparent.

The congressional candidate, Mr. Hackett, has probably carried the county by only 200, and his defeat seems certain. The official count, may show a little better vote for all of the above.

The State ticket, headed by Mr. Kitchin, held its own and polled a very comfortable majority. It was elected by majorities ranging from 40,000 to 50,000.

### Assaulted Little Child.

Carlton Jackson, a negro claiming to be from Norfolk, Va., is in jail charged with a most revolting and brutal crime. The victim in this case was a 7-year-old daughter of a negro woman named Mary Davis. The mother gave a detail account of the affair to officers, and an examination was made later by Dr. Foust, county superintendent of health, and the result of his examination bore out the story related by the mother. The evidence against the man seems to be very strong. He will be tried at the ensuing term of the Superior Court.
