In this way the desired form can be better secured. and there is less danger of accident. The men employed should be careful not to do more damage by breaking and bruising than they do good by pruning. A rope properly adjusted about the waist and fastened to a stout limb above the workman is an excellent means of sustaining the principal weight of the body while moving about through the tree. The form and direction of the cut when removing

branches depends upon the position of the branch on the tree and upon whether it is to be simply shortened or entirely removed. Erect branches are shortened by cutting them at an angle, thus preventing the undue entrance of water, while side branches are cut perpendicularly for the same Need of Enterprise." 
