THE NEW COURT.

Rowan County Court Duly Inaugurated and Commences Business.

The Rowan County Court, erroneously spoken of as the "Recorder's Court," which was established by act of the last General Assembly, is now an accomplished fact in Salisbury.

The first session of the court was held yesterday at the court house. B. B. Miller, Esq., presided, and Kerr Craig, Esq., represented the State as solicitor, these gentlemen having been appointed by the act establishing the court. There was quite a crowd present, no doubt attracted by the novelty of the thing. Everything moved along smoothly and business was dispatched without hitch. There were several violators of the law on hand for trial and these had justice meted out to them. Herewith is a list of the cases disposed of and the names of those who had the doubtful distinction of figuring as defendants at the first session:

Dave Love and John W. Dent, assault with deadly weapon. In this case knives had been brought into play but no serious injury resulted. The defendants pleaded guilty and Dent was fined \$5 and Love \$10.

Mary Brandon was charged with carrying concealed weapons and found guilty. She was allowed to choose between thirty days on the chain gang, or \$10 ad costs.

Minnie Brown, who had been arrested for disorderly conduct and put up a bond for \$5.00, forfeited the bond rather than show up for trial.

George Parker was in the same category as Minnie Brown.

Fred. Sowers paid one dollar and costs for a case of simple assault.

The clerk of Superior Court, with his deputy, were present and will show up at the sessions of the court regularly, as the law requires.

Messrs. Miller and Craig will hold their respective offices until the next regular election, at which time the judge and solicitor will be voted for. It is too early yet to say anything as to the usefulness of this court, beyond the fact that it will undoubtedly dispose of a number of small cases which otherwise would take up the time of the Superior Court.

THE MUNICIPAL PRIMARY.

A. L. Smoot Nominated for Mayor and an Excellent Board of Aldermen.

One of the most interesting municipal primaries held in Salisbury for many long years was pulled off here Saturday. The principals in the contest were two of Salisbury's most excellent young business men: W. B. Strachan, a member of the McCubbins & Harrison Co., and at present a member of the Board of Aldermen, and A. L. Smoot, until recently a member of the firm of Smoot Bros. & Rogers, ex-Register of Deeds and ex-Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners. There was no cause for mud-slinging and none was indulged in, the campaign being conducted on a high plain, there being no more than a friendly rivalry and good will existed among the candidates and their friends, a condition to be thankful for, a credit to the town and all concerned.

The polls opened at 12 o'clock, closed at 7 p. m., and things were quite lively during the hours of voting. The choice between the candidates being so slight hardly more than an average vote was polled.

The vote of the various candidates, by wards, is as follows:

NORTH WARD.
For mayor: A. L. Smoot, 180; W. A. Strachan, 106. For aldermen: W. B. Summersett, 149; W. A. Daniels, 133; C. J. Norman, 115; W. R. Cox, 48. Summersett and Daniels being declared the nominees.

EAST WARD.
For Mayor: A. L. Smoot, 182; W. B. Strachan, 138. For aldermen: J. W. Surratt, 158; A. Parker, 126; George H. Shaver, 87; Matthew Cauble, 84; T. A. Fisher, 60. If 265 is taken as the total number of votes cast in this ward, there was only one man

nominated for alderman, Mr. Surratt, but the convention ratified the nomination of Surratt and Parker.

WEST WARD.
For mayor: A. L. Smoot, 91; W. B. Strachan, 85. For Aldermen: F. M. Thompson, 110; J. S. McCubbins, 109; R. J. Holmes, 100; and F. J. Mardock, Jr., 20. Thompson and McCubbins, being declared the nominees.

SOUTH WARD.
For mayor: A. L. Smoot, 158; W. B. Strachan, 96. For Aldermen: L. E. Heilig, 180; P. M. Bernhardt, 124; C. L. Welch, 102; C. H. Swink, 49. There was some talk of a second primary in this ward, but the nomination of Heilig and Bernhardt is conceded and no further contest will be had.

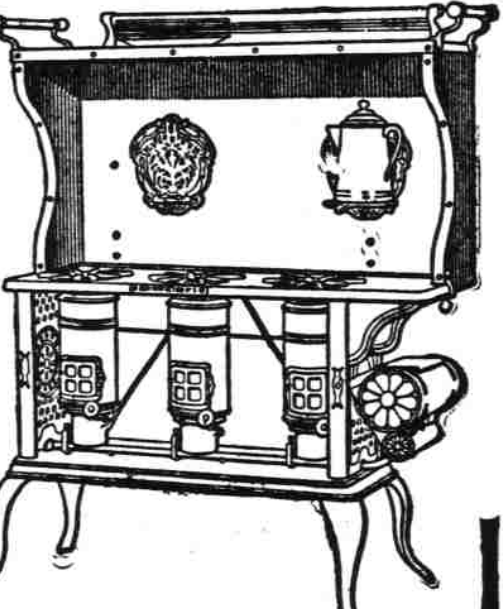
A mass meeting was held at the court house at 8 o'clock and the nomination of A. L. Smoot was made unanimous and ratified together with those of the aldermen as noted above.

Mr. Smoot's total vote was 506; Strachan's total vote was 420. Smoot's majority, 86.
