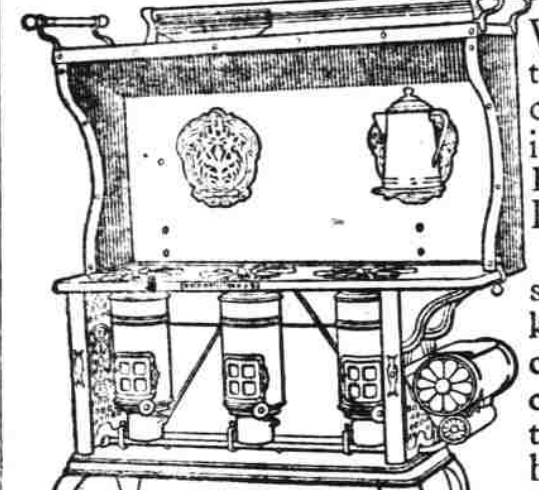
Offer \$35,000 Reward.

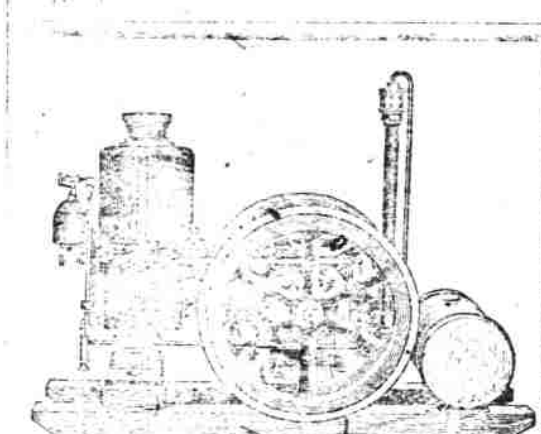
