As was to be expected an election is to be held this fall for the purpose of deciding whether or not bonds shall be issued to build the proposed railroad from Salisbury to Monre. You see the building of railroads is a very costly business, even after the right of way has been secured by donation and purchase and bonds have been issued. This idea of the people paying for a thing by the issue of bonds and then turning the whole thing over to a handful of promoters is too mediaeval to interest the thrifty masses of this day and time. If they are to pay for the road, or any portion of it, in bonds they should be given a first mortgage, or its equivalent, on the road, or else no bonds.

As Representation Cowles is representing this district in Congress for the last term he will have, it is hardly worth while to comment to any extent upon his bill, which has for its purpose the reviving of reconstruction measures against the south. According to the Washington correspondent of the Charlotte Observer, Mr. Cowles says: "Our Governor is not in sympathy with us and in the last campaign he was quoted in the newspapers as having declared in a public speech that a "Republican had as well deposit his ballot in a rural free delivery box as a ballot box; that if they wanted their votes counted they had better vote for him." No man in the State knows better than Mr. Cowles that Gov. Kitchen said nothing of the sort. He does not plainly charge that he did use the language quoted, but he circulates the report in the hope that many members of his party will believe it. Mr Cowles knows Gov. Kitchen is not a fool and he also knows that no candidate, unless he was a fool of the pursat ray scene, would ever make such an assertion in public.

As noted in our local columns the authorities are endeavoring to cut down the speed of automobiles in the city limits. This, it seems to us, is a very proper thing to do. Governments are for the purpose of protecting the citizens and there is no doubt as to the necessity of some such regulations. The driving of an automobile through the streets at a high rate of speed is as dangerous as a locomotive, a street car or a runaway team and the life of citizens are in jeopardy, both directly and indirectly. The law is a very timely one, many narrow escapes have occurred, and it is much wiser to take steps to prevent accidents rather than attempt to adjust matters after something has happened. It is certainly encouraging and refreshing to have an administration in power that is making every honorable effort to enforce all laws without any regard or respect for persons. The laws are made to be enforced and the officers are but doing their plain duty. Stength to their arms!
