Southern Improving Track Between Salisbury and Hickory.

The Southern railway is repairing the track between Salisbury and Hickory. The track was in very poor condition the early part of the summer but owing to the heavy rainfall the company decided to delay the extensive repairs, which include a practical rebuild ing of the track, until the weath erchanged.

The maintainance department put a large force of men at work within the past two weeks and the work is progressing rapidly. The track will be entirely rebuilt and an eighty-pound rail laid the entire length of the division between these two cities. New ties are being put in as well and a new ballast. 
