Mr. Link was active in religious circles, was president of the Bara a Class of the First Methodist church; he was lately connected with the Salisbury Realty and Insurance Co., and had a bright future before him. A large circle of friends mourn his loss.

**ALBEMARLE AND STANLY COUNTY.**

**Railroad Preparing to Move Dirt Damaged by Storm. Telephones Damaged.**

The Efrid band has purchased new instruments, twenty in all, costing more than \$1,100. The leader, Prof. S. Ludwig, says it is one of the finest lot of band instruments to be found anywhere.

Carloads of working material for the company which has the contract for grading the section of the Southbound Railway that includes Albemarle, now stands on the Southern sidetracks at this place. Dinkey engines, carts, shovels, etc., give an air of business to the project, and the toot of the whistle seems to be not far off.

After twenty years of activity with the firm of Sears, Roebuck & Company, the great mail order house of Chicago, R. P. Sears has retired with a fortune of \$25,000,000. M. C. Reynolds, contractor for one of the sections of the Southbound Railroad, is pitching his camp on the D. S. Talbert place 3 miles north of Albemarle. J. W. Woolfolk, book-keeper and commissary clerk, is having the necessary building erected, placing contracts, and employing workmen. This section covers one and one-half miles this side of Palestine, in which there is over 30,000 cubic yards of earth to be removed. Mr. Woolfolk says it will probably take eight months to complete the contract. He expects to begin shoveling dirt this week.

As a result from the wind and electric storm on Sunday afternoon, a fine milch cow of S. P. Dry was killed by a lightning bolt, some two or three houses were struck, doing minor damage, and the metal roof was blown from the engine room of the Wiscasset mill. The mill was ready to start up Monday morning after a shut-down of two weeks, but the injury to the large 4-foot driving belt made it necessary to delay starting another day. The damage is estimated at \$500. A force of hands worked several hours Sunday night during a heavy down-pour of rain improvising a roof to protect the large Corliss engines. Aside from this damage, the rain came as a blessing, as crops were suffering from the long drought.

Manager W. M. Ivey, of the local telephone company, says that the heavy wires of the Southern Power Company are playing havoc with rural telephone lines, and it means in simple English that all rural lines within the radius effected by the power company's wires will have to resort to metallic circuits or else abandon the business. This means quite an expense to the telephone companies, but would also mean an improved service. Mr. Ivey says the local exchange is quite perceptible when the full current of 80,000 volts of the Southern Power Company is turned on, and the rural lines effected by the crossing may have to be cut off soon until full metallic circuit is substituted for the present system. Only a few of the local telephone company's lines into private homes are effected, and these will not materially hamper the service.

**Company Chartered to Manufacture Flying Machines at Wilmington.**

The American Aeroplane Co., Wilmington, is chartered to manufacture flying machines, capital \$125,000. The incorporators are prominent business and professional men of Wilmington, including F. A. Bittinger, W. B. Cooper, D. J. H. Dreh, Dr. Russell Bellamy and David Palmgren. The company will develop a flying machine recently invented in Wilmington, the model of which is said to promise great things. The first actual, full fledged flying machine of this pattern is to be ready for public demonstration on the occasion of President Taft's visit to Wilmington in November.

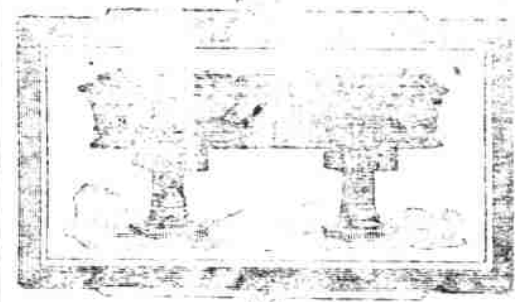

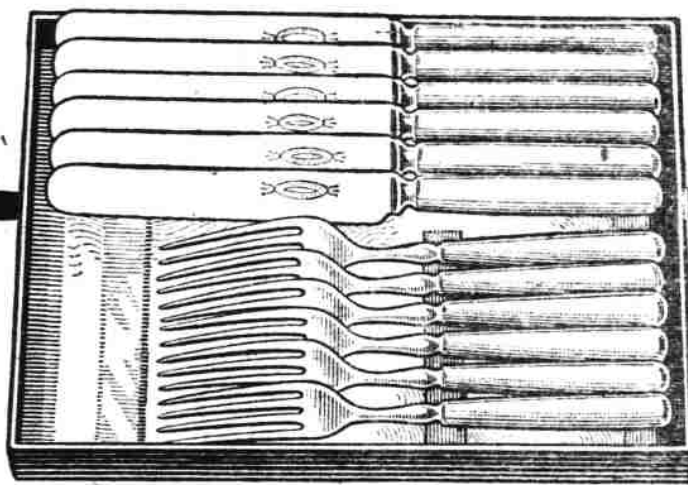
