Bread From Cotton Seed Meal. Mr. Patterson Will Move to Salisbury.
Staeville Landmark, March 18-19.

County Treasurer Sloan is still confined to his home on account of his afflicted hand. The hand healed, as the result of an electric shock, and it was found necessary to lance it in eight places.

O. F. Englebirt, and employe of the North State Veneer Company, was painfully and probably seriously injured yesterday morning while at work at the veneer plant. Mr. Englebirt was operating a rip-saw when a piece of timber was caught by the teeth of the saw and hurled against his stomach with terrific force. The skin was not broken by the blow, but Mr. Englebirt has suffered intense pain and it is feared that he has been injured internally.

Fire of unknown origin was discovered in the southeast wing of the Imperial Furniture Company's plant Wednesday night about 10 o'clock and before the flames could be checked the upper story of that portion of the building was gutted and considerable damage done. The quick work of employes of the plant, who used the private fire fighting apparatus very effectively, and the promptness of the city fire department, which soon had a stream playing on the flames, saved the building from total destruction. The damage as it is, from fire and water, will amount to several thousand dollars. The loss is covered by insurance.

Messrs. J. Conner and J. Claude Peterson, of Staeville, who are stockholders in the Holmes-Cathey Company, the new concern which will conduct a harness and vehicle business at Salisbury, went to Salisbury Wednesday to assist J. P. Cathey in "starting off" the business. Mr. Peterson, who was formerly with the Flanagan Harness Company, will have charge of the harness department of the new business and will make his home in Staeville. Mr. Peterson, who has been with a Salisbury firm for some time, and recently moved his family there, will be in charge of the the vehicle department. Mr. Conner will not be actively associated with the conduct of the business at Salisbury, but will remain with the Harness, Vehicle & Supply Co. in Staeville.

M. W. White, of Mooresville, who returned Wednesday night from a visit to Texas, sends The Landmark, by the hands of J. F. Anderson, a sample of bread and cake made in Texas from cotton seed meal. The bread, which is about two-thirds cotton seed meal and one-third flour, resembles bread made from Graham flour, being almost as dark as a ginger cake, but is said to be very palatable. The cake sent The Landmark is a piece of fruit cake and is made almost entirely from the cotton seed meal, only a little flour being used. Where the meal is being used doughnuts are made entirely from it, no flour being used. Time will be necessary to allay the natural prejudice, but if the idea of cotton seed meal for bread is pushed, the meal will soon become an important factor in bread making. If palatable and healthful, the color will have little weight after one gets used to it.

VICTIM OF A BRUTAL ASSAULT.

Found at the Home of Jake Coble Weltering in His Own Blood.
Greensboro, March 18.—John M. Staley, who lived at Julian, 15 miles south of Greensboro, died at St. Leo's hospital in this city this morning from the effects of a murderous assault committed upon him Sunday afternoon. The crime appears to be shrouded in mystery, but warrants have been issued for three men who are under strong suspicion. They are: Jake Coble and his son, Wade Coble, and a negro named Albert Ryan.

Staley, who was 50 years old, and a man without family, resided with a brother near the village of Julian. He left home Saturday evening and his relatives heard nothing more of him until Sunday afternoon, when they ascertained that he was lying at the home of a neighbor, Jake Coble, badly wounded and unconscious. This information was derived from the fact that Coble had sent one of his sons for a physician to attend the wounded man. When the brother reached the Coble home he found John Staley in his own blood, more dead than alive. There was blood on the floor of the room, and there were other circumstances tending to show that a foul crime had been committed on the Coble premises.

Coble told a story of the wounded man having been brought to his house by his son, Wade, and avowed that he was looking after him as a matter of humanity. The wounded man did not regain consciousness and of course was unable to tell anything of the tragedy. He had been struck across the head with a blunt weapon and beaten about the body, the blow on the head causing a fracture of the skull.—Charlotte Observer.

Beaver had been ill about three days, but her condition was not considered alarming. She was better Saturday and at sunrise Sunday morning her husband started to the home of the attending physician, a few miles away, to consult with the doctor concerning the further treatment of his wife. He had gone but a short distance, however, when a relative, who had been left at the bedside of the woman, overtook him on horseback and informed him that his wife had suddenly expired. Mrs. Beaver was born in Boston and was reared in Rowan county. She was about 65 to 70 years old and was married to Mr. Beaver shortly after the civil war. She is survived by her husband and one sister, Miss Margaret Bostian, who made her home with the deceased.

A distressing accident occurred at the Barium Orphan's Home Saturday morning when David Stanley, a 13 year-old inmate of the institution, was horribly and possibly fatally hurt by coming in contact with a wood saw. Young Stanley and a number of other boys were engaged in operating a steam wood saw and while assisting another youth in placing a heavy piece of wood on the saw rack, Stanley accidentally fell, or was accidentally shoved against the rapidly revolving saw. His back was next to the saw when he fell and the teeth of the saw caught him just above the left shoulder blade and jerked him entirely across the top of the saw, cutting a terrible gash from his shoulder blade down to the hip bone.

HOW HOGS SHOULD BE FED IN THE SOUTH

Grain Feed is Too Expensive, But With Forage Crops Pork Can be Made Cheaply.
We should grow hogs on green rape, rye, barley and oats and a little dry corn in January and February; on green crimson clover, bur clover, vetch, oats, etc., and a little dry corn in March; on clovers and rape and a little dry corn in April and May; on green clovers and ripe oats in June; on green clovers, peas, soy beans and a little dry corn in July and August, and fatten them during September, October, November and December in about the following: If on September 1st, a pig weighing 100 pounds be put on soy beans or cowpeas, or both, and fed about one-fourth of a full ration of corn, he will weigh from 125 to 135 pounds by October 1st. If during October he is put on soy beans or peas and fed about one-fourth of a ration of corn, he should grow 40 pounds, or reach weight of from 165 to 175 pounds by November 1st. During November, on peanuts and a one-fourth ration of corn, he will reach from 200 to 215 pounds, and then if during December he be fed a one-fourth ration of cottonseed meal and the other three-fourths corn, or if he be allowed a one-fourth ration of peanuts and a three-fourths ration of corn until the weather of Christmas time, and is then slaughtered he will weigh from 225 to 240 pounds and will have been produced at from 8 to 4 cents a pound, and the profit will be such that we need give no other reason why we should grow more hogs.—Raleigh (N. C.) Progressive Farmer and Gazette.

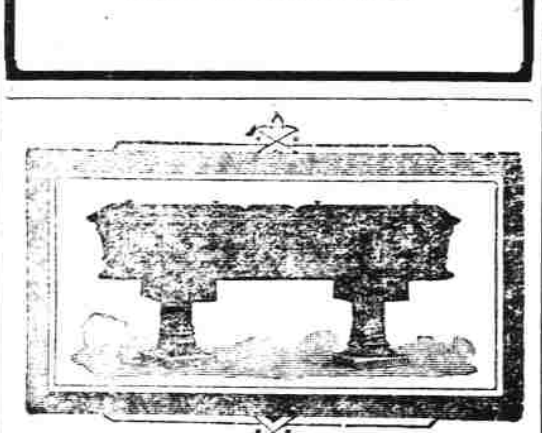

A Railroad Regulation That is Void.

A stipulation in the bill of lading of a railroad that unless a claim for damages for damaged or lost freight is filed with the railroad within 30 days after the freight is delivered, the railroad is not responsible for the damage or loss, is held to be void by the State Supreme Court, in the case of Dean and Brown vs. Railroad Company. Judge Manning, who wrote the opinion for the court, states that such a stipulation is unreasonable and contravenes public policy and is void.
