WORK OF THE REAPER.

D. M. Pennington, Sumner Lambeth and Josh. A. Hoffner are the victims.

D. M. Pennington, one of Franklin Township's most prominent farmers and a brave confederate veteran, died at his home on Tuesday morning from the effects of paralysis. Mr. Pennington had the first stroke several months ago and was for some time almost completely incapacitated, but had so fully recovered that he was able to do light work and has since paid several visits to town. It was hoped that with proper care and treatment he might fully recover, so, the news of his sudden death came as a shock to his family and friends everywhere. He is survived by a wife, one daughter, Mrs. Simpson Pipkin, and five sons: John, James, Brant, Charles and Franklin. The funeral was held at Mt. Tabor Church, at 11 o'clock, this morning, Rev. Stoner officiating.

Sumner Lambeth, the eleven-year-old son of J. W. Lambeth, of Thomasville, died at the Whitehead-Stokes Sanatorium at 7:20 on Monday evening from septicaemia. The remains were taken to Thomasville, on train No. 44, Tuesday, and the funeral was held there at 11 o'clock to-day.

Josh. A. Hoffner died, at 6:30 o'clock, Monday, at his home, 118 West Kerr Street, tuberculosis. The funeral was held from his house at 10 o'clock this morning, being conducted by Revs. Motley and Turrentine. The interment will be made in Chestnut Hill cemetery. Mr. Hoffner was 34 years of age and leaves a wife and two children. The Sapona Tribe of Red men, of which Mr. Hoffner was a member, attended the funeral in a body.
