**The peas should be the most abundant plant upon every farm in the South.**

The intelligent and economical farmer will so manage his land that it produce at least one crop of peas every three years. Whether these peas are turned under or are saved and fed, they cannot fail to pay. No man has done his full duty to his farm until he has seen to it that peas are grown upon every foot that it is possible for them to grow upon. Plant peas early in the morning, at noon, in the evening. Plant them early in the season and later plant peas as long as there is a chance for them to make any-thing, and then, when next spring comes and your neighbor is paying 20 cents a pound for nitrogen and starting his plants for it, show him your crop and with pen-cil and paper figure how many dollars the peas have saved you. 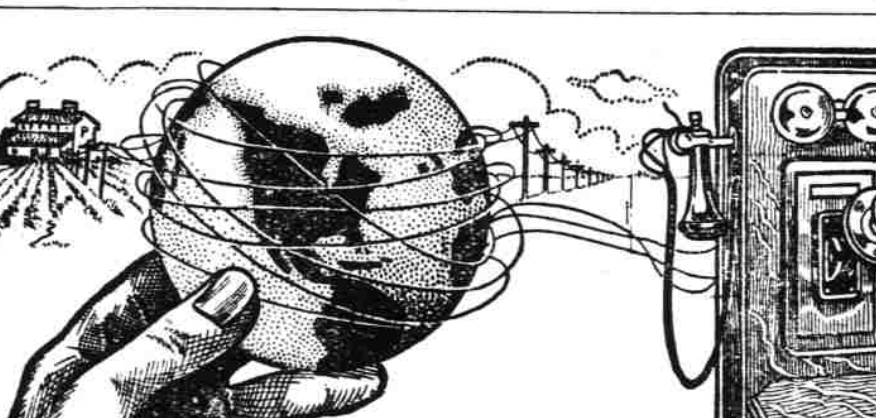
