HEALTH AND SANITATION.

Meet at Chapel Hill, N. C.

At Chapel Hill last week the superintendents of public schools for the various counties of the State met in regular session. Nearly every county was represented. Dr. F. P. Venable, president of the university, welcomed the body of educators and spoke brief. ly of the responsibility and importance of each county superintendent of schools.

The meeting then proceeded with the program, which was a most interesting one. Some of the topics discussed were: Health Two prominent young people and Sanitation, Instruction in and death are preventable, those this time. Luther Leo Peeler, son Agriculture, Public High Schools, Uniform examinations for Teachers, Teacher Training,. Elementary Schools, and work of the County Superintendent. The session at which health and

sanitsion were discussed was ex-

ceedingly interesting. Dr. W. S. Rankin, secretary of North Carolina Board of Health, discussed health and sanitation. Dr. John A. Ferell representing the Hookworm Commission of the North Carolina Board of Health, spoke briefly of investigations, which show the wide-spread prevalence of hookworm disease in North Carolina. He explained that in theory the eradication of the disease was easy, but in practice a great problem, the solution of which depended upon educational work. Many questions were asked and requests made that cases be described as they usually are before and after treatment. Prof. Highsmith, of Wake Forest College, cited two or three interesting cases he had seen. Then Superintent Thompson, of Onslow among hookworm victims in his

> the Association of County Superintedents of Schools, of North Carolina, are convinced of the wipespread of the prevalence of the hookworm disease in the State. and that the disease occasion ines timable loss to the State in lives, vitality, citizenship and material wealth; and, whereas the disease

is both preventable and curable. Be it resolved that the association hereby pledges the co-speration in all well organized movements for the eradication of the disease: and further realizing that such a movement has already been inaugurated, we recommend that the State take such steps as may be found necessary to aid in accomplishing the desired end.

The meeting adjourned Friday, after a most successful and pleasant meeting.


