The Rowan Dredging Association.

This is the name of an association that seems to have been originated in Iredell county and organized in Rowan for the purpose of employing council, having Rowan purchase a dredging outfit and force the cleaning out of Third Creek. There can be no objection to the cleaning out of Third Creek by those who own the land along its banks. In fact it seems to be an important idea. The cleaning out and straightening of the creek channels would no doubt improve the adjoining land and, to some extent benefit the health of the residents in the neighborhood. But when it comes to the question of health it will take more than the mere dredging of the creeks. Malaria and numerous other diseases come from mosquito bites, hence all stagnant water must be removed, or the work will fail of this purpose. We see no reason why the county should join in this work except to benefit the public health, which, if undertaken properly would necessitate the organization and maintenance of a large force covering the entire county with the dredging business as the central effort.

The mere improvement of somebody's land at the public's expense cannot be considered a moment, that would be a game of graft, which, of course, is in no wise being considered. Our commissioners are too alert for anything of the kind nor do our people expect such favoritism.

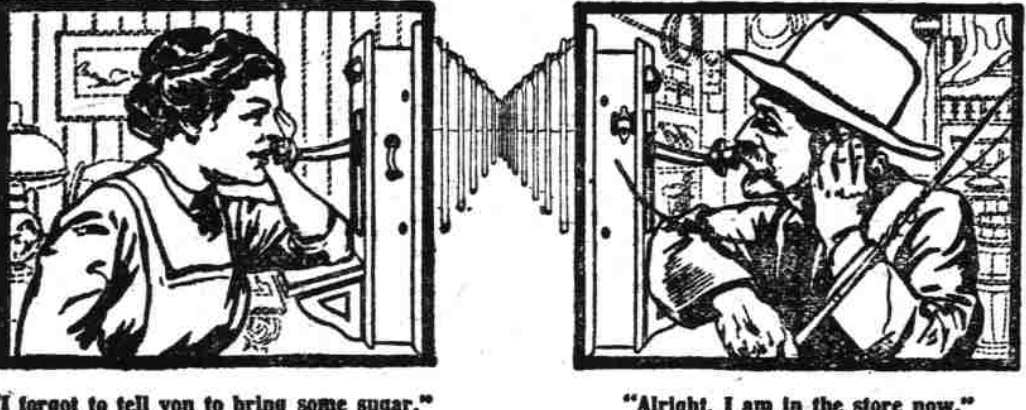
