COMMISSIONERS ON A HIGH NOTE.

Evidently Do not intend to Allow the People to Have Say in Court House Matter.

The Rowan county commissioners met in regular monthly session Monday, the full board being present. The following is a report of the proceedings:

Supt. C. S. Carter, of chain gang No. 1, reported 20 convicts, 8 whites, 17 colored. Supt. G. Y. Thomas of chain gang No. 2 reported 23 convicts, 8 whites, 18 colored, 2 females.

Mrs. C. S. Patterson, superintendent county home, reported 18 inmates, 8 whites and five colored.

Dr. M. L. Smoot, county superintendent of health, reported the health of the county charges fairly good.

A number of reductions were ordered on assessment of property.

Ordered to allow Mrs. D. A. K. to pay for burial expenses, their husbands having been Confederate soldiers.

W. R. Culp wants exemption from poll tax and road duty.

A delegation from Gold Hill township appeared and asked that a repair work be done on the Gold Hill road and were assured that steps will be taken to repair all the roads in the county and they would be given the relief as soon as possible.

A delegation from Franklin and Unity townships appeared and stated they had condition of the road through the western part of the county; also, stated the importance of said roads and emphasized the justice of their claim asking when the first new work started that they be given it. It was the sense of the board to reach them as soon as possible.

Ordered that Dr. M. J. Ragland be and is hereby appointed meat inspector for Rowan, and that all meat sold by vendors on the city market be inspected by him.

Ordered that Mr. Felt be allowed an extension of 60 working days to complete the China Grove-Saw road, provided his bondsmen agree to such extension.

Ordered that R. W. Price be appointed as standard keeper for Rowan county.

Ordered that bill of \$63.80 from C. O. Glover to Salisbury Hardware & Furniture Co. for material furnished in county home be paid and same be charged to Glover's account.

Ordered that bid be given to Overman & Co. for supplies for ensuing month.

Ordered that the Stateville road be surveyed from the creek to the Walk-shore road.

Ordered that Rowan County build a new court house costing from \$100,000 to \$125,000 and that ad be placed in the Manufacturers' Record for plans and specifications, the same to be submitted to the board the first Monday in March, the county commission reserve the right to reject any and all bids.

A franchise was granted the Gold Hill Telephone Co. to construct lines and erect poles in Salisbury and Rowan.

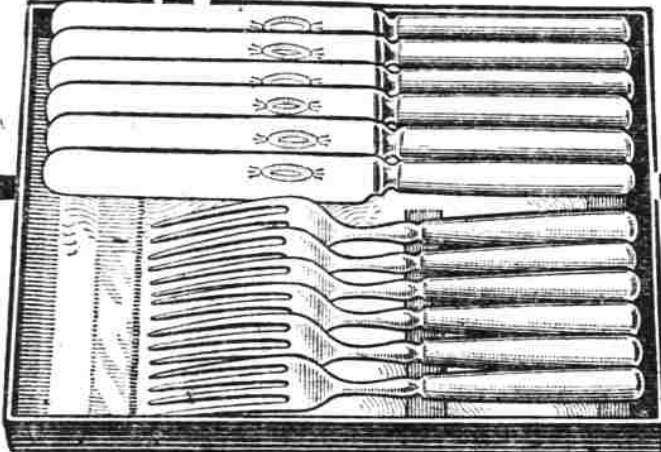

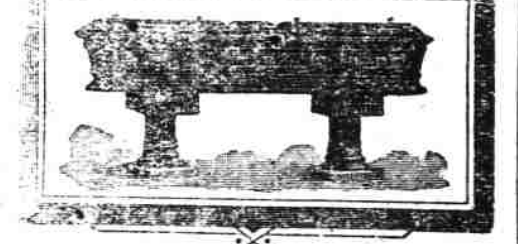
