The Baraca and Philathea Convention.

One of the biggest conventions in the history of Salisbury convened in the Washington building here Saturday night at 8 o'clock. It was the State Baraca and Philathea Association composed of several hundred of the flower of North Carolina's Christian men and women. The meeting was called to order by State president, A. L. Smoot. E. W. Tatam made a short address of welcome on behalf of the Salisbury Baracas and Whitehead Kluttz, Esq., on behalf of the city, to which response was made by S. D. Berry of Raleigh. Mrs. C. A. G. Thomas read a paper and A. B. Saleeby spoke on the subject: "A Man with a Banner."

Sunday morning special services were held in most all the churches, including a special service by Rev. B. E. Steele, in the Lutheran Church and Marshall A. Hudson in the Spencer Y. M. C. A. At 2:45 Sunday evening the delegates assembled in front of the Empire Hotel, formed a

line and marched four abreast

down to Kerr Street and back to the Grubb theatre where a big mass meeting was held. It is said there were seven hundred in line, three hundred women and four hundred men, a very inspiring scene. The Salisbury and Dixie Bands were in the parade and furnished music. The streets were lined with spectators. A. L. Smoot was master of ceremonies at the theatre which was filled to its utmost.

An overflow meeting was held in the First Methodist church, and those present were addressed by Marshall A. Hudson.

Sunday night special services were held by Mr. Hudson and Miss Henrietta Heron in the Methodist and Baptist churches, large crowds attending each.

Monday was given up to business matters. The Baracas and Philatheas met at the post office and had their picture taken as they stood on the steps and near by.

The meeting closed Monday night with a splendid address by Dr. W. L. Poteat, president of Wake Forest College, and an appreciative audience heard Dr. Poteat.
