The Work of the Progressives Has Just Begun.

"We have ended the fight but the fight has just begun," said Senator Dixon, chairman of the Progressive national committee. "We shall not waste any time over the recent election, but shall begin at once the work of getting the new party in shape to accomplish results in the future. What that really means is not realized but when we go to Washington and ask recognition in Federal patronage and on all boards and committees which are apportioned between the two leading parties, our status will be made clear.

Then we will take up the question of our representation in Congress and what is to be done to increase the number of our men there two years hence. I feel as if I were standing among my younger comrades tonight."

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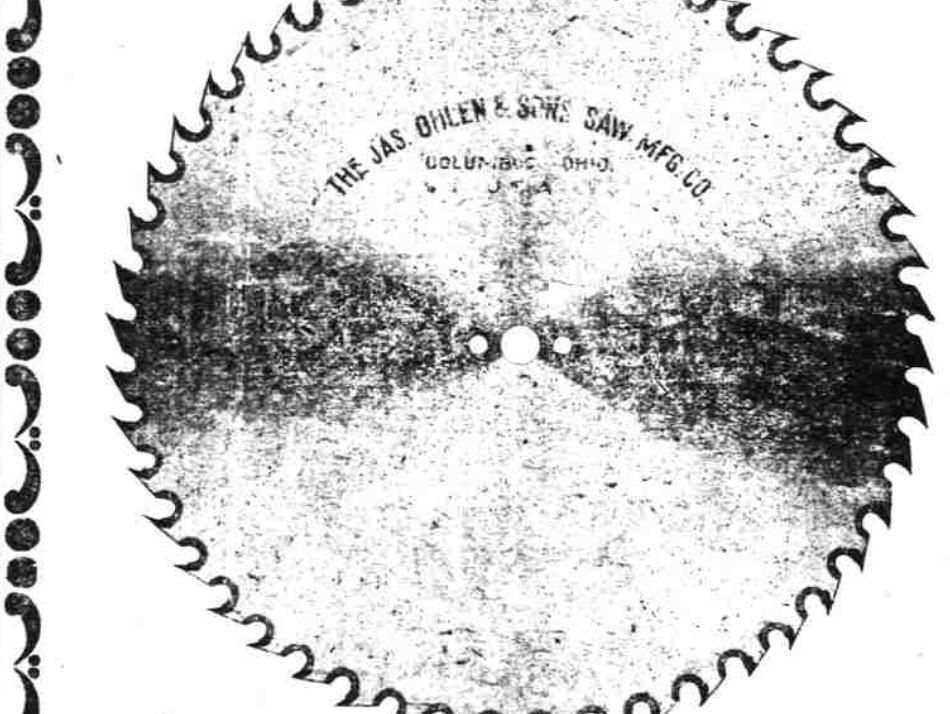
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
