**PROCEEDINGS OF THE LEGISLATURE.**

\$1,142,500 Bonds for State's Bills, Senate Considers Deficit of \$600,000.

Raleigh, Feb. 26.—The House today passed the Justice corrupt practice act with little discussion, an amendment by Miller was adopted to punish as a felony any promise of office as a reward for political support, also the committee amendment requiring signatures to derogatory statements published.

Candidates for Governor and United States Senate can spend only one year's salary in campaigning. Fifty per cent. of the salary attached to other offices sought can be spent in campaigning.

A new bill by Doughton would provide for State inspection of liquors shipped into the State. The inspection is made under the direction of the health department and the inspector is to receive \$250 salary and fees ranging from five cents on the package of less than a gallon to 25 cents on five gallons and larger packages.

Raleigh, Feb. 25.—The Joint Committee on Agriculture determined this afternoon, 7 to 8 report favorably the bill to allow 80 instead of 22 pounds for bagging and ties on cotton bales. There was a lively discussion in which prominent cotton men participated in opposition, and others in favor of the bill. The opponents of the bill assured the committee that if the bill was passed, it would be imperative and cause discrimination against North Carolina cotton. They contended that the present scale of tare allowances were world-wide and could not be affected by North Carolina legislation. Mr. Thompson went further and gave notice to the committee that the legislature could not force the North Carolina manufacturers to increase the allowance, that it is obliged to be taken off the price paid by manufacturers.

Raleigh, March 3.—House passed a bill to establish a drainage district of Rowan county. Representative Carlton today introduced a bill which prescribes the ballots in Salisbury.

To amend the law as to elections in Salisbury.

Placing certain officers of Rowan County on salaries.

Senator Long introduced in the Senate tonight bills providing for a bond issue of \$1,142,500 to meet the existing deficit, to provide for permanent improvements at the State institutions, equipping, furnishing and painting the new State building and rearranging and refurnishing the present Supreme Court building and establishing a central heating plant for the Capitol and other State buildings. The apportionment is as follows:

Deficit, \$600,000; equipping new State building, \$75,000; central heating plant, \$40,000; rearranging old Supreme Court building, \$40,000; Morganton Hospital, \$50,000; Goldsboro Hospital, \$25,000; A. & M. College, \$25,000; University, \$100,000; State Normal, \$50,000; A. & M. at Greensboro, \$17,500; Appalachian Training School, \$15,000; Cullowhee Institute, \$15,000; East Carolina Training School, \$40,000; Tuberculosis Hospital, \$20,000; new site for School for Blind, \$80,000.

The Senate passed the committee bill assigning quarters to the various State departments in the new State building and old Supreme Court building, in accordance with the report of the special committee, with an amendment giving to the Department of Agriculture, in addition to its present quarters, the rooms now used by the Corporation Commission.

The Senate passed bills for election on salary system in One-leaf County, for establishing office of auditor of Mecklenburg County; protecting quail in Brunswick and New Hanover counties; for Brunswick County to cede Eagle Island to New Hanover under certain conditions; to protect game in New Hanover by reducing the open season 80 days; appointing a deputy for Robeson County and to amend Revisal relative to pay of Robeson County Board of Education.

**BRYAN HEADS CABINET.**

War, Agriculture and Interior were Last Portfolios to Become Definitely Known.

Washington, March 3.—Though President-elect Wilson will not send the names of his Cabinet to the Senate until tomorrow afternoon, authoritative information as to its personnel came from members of his official family when he arrived today. Washington now accepts the slate named below as constituting the slate named.

Many of these names have been known for several days and chief interest centered in the revelation of those who would receive the portfolios of War, Agriculture and Interior.

Secretary of Agriculture, David F. Houston of Missouri.

Secretary of Commerce, William C. Redfield of New York.

Secretary of Labor, William B. Wilson of Pennsylvania.

Professor J. A. Bivins Passes to Last Reward.

The many friends all over the State of Prof. J. A. Bivins will be saddened to learn of his sudden death Sunday night about 11 o'clock. From all reports it is indicated that he had been in splendid health, had partaken of a hearty supper and had retired, when he suffered a sudden attack of the heart which resulted in his death.

While superintendent of the graded school at Monroe he married Mrs. E. J. McKenzie, formerly Miss Ellie Howard, who survives him. Professor Bivins was about 50 years of age and in the full vigor of his powers. He was regarded throughout the State as one of the most capable and popular experts on all matters pertaining to educational topics in the South. He was appointed supervisor of teacher training in North Carolina several years ago. Entering upon the duties of the office, he achieved marked success from the outset. Mr. Bivins was esteemed as one of the most valuable workers for the betterment of educational conditions in North Carolina.

Three brothers survive him, Messrs. J. D. Bivins, editor of The Allemarle Enterprise; C. M. Bivins and W. A. Bivins, the latter a resident of Old Trinity. The deceased was a native of Stanly county where he spent the early years of his manhood. He was self-made and came of a vigorous stock, gifted, enterprising and possessing a keen insight into human nature.

Professor Bivins was residing in Raleigh at the time of his death.

**Salisbury is to be Stirred With Elections.**

The election on the commission form of government for Salisbury has been called for Tuesday, March 18th. A new registration has been ordered and all who wish to vote on this subject will have to register. The registration books for this purpose will be open from Thursday, March 6, until the day of election. The voting places will be in the various wards and will be the same as heretofore, to-wit: Court house, livery stable opposite court house, water works office and city hall.

After this election there may be three others, election of the mayor and two commissioners, the election on the extension of the city limits, and, if the commission form of government fails, then the regular primary and election for a mayor and city aldermen.

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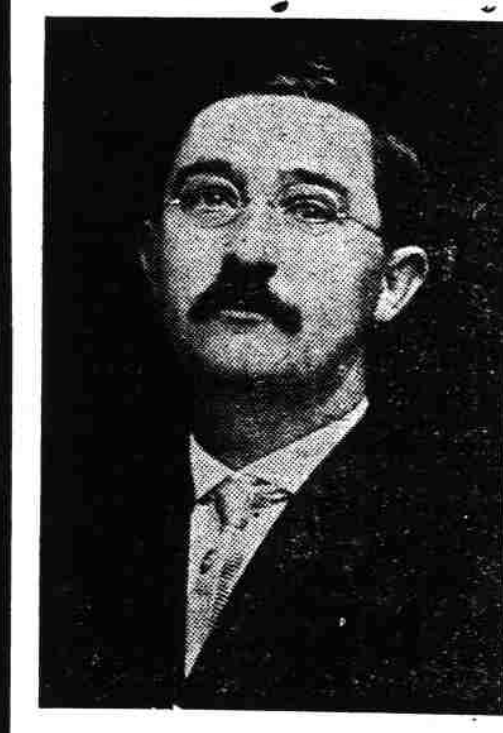
