A. E. Tate Has Started For Home.

High Point, July 18.—A. E. Tate of this city, who has sailed for America after spending several months in Europe with the commission investigating the systems of rural credits, has written an interesting letter concerning the work of the commission, from which the following are extracts: "Since our commission reached Europe on May 10, we have studied all the co-operative agricultural systems and have found that they have practically revolutionized agricultural development in these countries. The farmers are being lifted up to a state of independence and freedom such as they have never seen before, through the medium of these co-operative societies and credit banks. Where they were formerly forced to obtain their financial requirements from persons who abstracted from them enormous rates of interest and inflicted upon them hardship of all sorts, they now obtain credit from these co-operative rural banks at rates of interest varying from two and a half to five per cent, according to the length of time required and the character of loan made."

45 Railroads and 80,000 Men to Suffer by Strike.

New York, July 18.—Whether a strike of upwards of 80,000 conductors and trainmen on 45 eastern railroads shall be declared within the next few days, depends upon whether the railroads recede from their present position and withdraw from their refusal to arbitrate the wage and other differences between the companies and the men.

This declaration was made tonight in statements by the trainmen's representatives after the grievance committee of employees from the various railroads, in conference here, had ratified the strike vote recently taken and had authorized A. B. Garretson, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Conductors and W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, to issue the formal strike order to their respective organizations.

Washington, July 14.—Representatives of the 80,000 conductors and trainmen of eastern railroads who have voted to strike for higher wages, and managing officers of the railroads agreed at the White House today to submit their differences to arbitration under the provisions of the Newlands-Clayton act, which President Wilson and congressional leaders promised to make law by tomorrow night. In the meantime no strike will be declared, officials of the employees' brotherhoods agreeing to an armistice until Wednesday night.

Nation-Wide Fight on Liquor in 1920

Los Angeles, Cal., July 18.—To the question, "how to meet the liquor menace," Daniel A. Polling, speaking for the United Societies of Christian Endeavor, answered here today "educate and exterminate." The speaker, who is the National temperance and citizenship superintendent of the society, said weaknesses of the anti-saloon movement had been due to a lack of unity.

"But in this new militant educational campaign," he said, "which will be nationwide we will present a fighting platform of common agreement."

"We declare for National prohibition in 1920 as the eighteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States and because of past bitter defeats, where good laws have been entrusted to unfriendly and uncommitted administrations, we declare for the election of candidates and administrations outspokenly committed to the enforcement of existing temperance laws and to the complete destruction of the liquor traffic."
