Koons was talking over the phone Mr. Holshouser forgot about Rev. Koons being inside the store, locked the door and went to dinner. When Rev. Koons finished talking to his party over the phone to his amazement he found he was in the lock-up, so he phoned to James Holshouser who is mayor of the town and also where Mr. Holshouser boards, to see what the chance would be to get out. So in a short time Mr. Holshouser, accompanied by Rev. Andrews, and several other ministers, appeared at the scene and after a short conference was held it was decided to give Rev. Koons his freedom. This was quite a joke on Rev. Koons but it was not intended so, and was only caused by an oversight. Stuff About Mex. cc.

Washington, May 10.—The Adjutant General's office of the War Department has ordered all enlisted men, which includes non-commissioned officers to report their availability "in case of emergency" and many seasoned soldiers may be added to the active list.

Much apprehension is felt in diplomatic quarters as to the fate of Mexico City in case a sudden revolt should overthrow General Huerta and permit the entry of the lawless hordes of Zapata and other undisciplined rebel bands. Foreigners in the capital are said to number 6,000 not counting Americans, most of whom have left. Zapata is regarded as the immediate menace. A government official, who recently returned from Mexico described Zapata as the most revengeful of Indians.

A report has reached the Foreign Legations here of a threat to send Zapata here from time to time to leading citizens and their wives and daughters that if captured Zapata would cut off their ears and "eat them fried."

Another from Zapata to the daughter of a merchant is said to have informed her in revolting language to prepare to become his wife on his taking of town. The chief fear in diplomatic quarters as to the city is that it will be ruined and looted by these people.
