Hattie Funder Fatally Shoots Tank Lewis.

Yesterday morning while Tank Lewis was putting up some wire screening at a window in the residence of Della Evans, all negroes, he was deliberately and apparently without cause shot down by Hattie Funder, who was inside the room. The ball either struck the heart, or very close thereto for Lewis lived only a few minutes after being shot.

Della Evans lives near the depot just south of the gas tanks and the reputation of the whole bunch likes much of being what it should be. Officers were called and after Hattie had come partly up town she was arrested and had the pistol with her. Coroner Summerett summoned a jury and after getting the evidence decided that Lewis came to his death from the effects of a revolver shot in the hands of Hattie Funder. Hattie made no defense more than to say "it was to shoot or be shot." It is thought she was full of cocaine. She was sent to jail without bond to await the next term of the Rowan Superior Court.

New Trains Put on.

Southern passenger train No. 18 passed through the city Sunday night from Richmond, Va., and No. 14 left Charlotte Monday morning for the Virginia capital at 9:45 o'clock. These two trains formerly stopped in Salisbury but were recently ordered extended to Charlotte as a result of the congested condition of travel between Salisbury and Charlotte. This will give Salisbury additional and better facilities. It is announced that as a result of the extension of these trains, No. 85, south, and No. 86, north, will drop the handling of local traffic and will not take on passengers at the smaller stations between Charlotte and Salisbury as has been the custom in the past.

It is to be hoped by the addition of this service south of Salisbury that it will enable the Southern to run its trains on schedule time. The trains, Nos. 11 and 7, especially, of late could only be expected when one could see the smoke, and this condition is a great annoyance and loss to those who attempt to business with the small towns south of Salisbury.

Mr. Baker was a Confederate soldier, a school teacher, superintendent of the board of education, a deacon in the Baptist Church for twenty-five years and of late conducted a small grocery store on North Ellis Street. Mr. Baker leaves a wife, four daughters, one son and several brothers and sisters. He was a splendid man, a good citizen and a loyal Christian. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon, being conducted by C. A. G. Thomas, pastor of the Baptist Church, the interment was in Chestnut Hill Cemetery.

Margie Rice, the twenty-year-old daughter of the late Leroy C. Rice, died in Richmond this morning from the effects of tuberculosis. She was at the home of her sister, Mrs. J. H. Brown, where she had gone, hoping for relief. Her remains will be brought to Salisbury and the funeral will likely be held to-morrow afternoon. She was a member of the Second Presbyterian Church and it is supposed her pastor, Rev. C. B. Heller, will conduct the funeral service.

Mrs. Bertha Land, wife of J. R. Land, a native of Kentucky, who has been making her home here for several years, died at her residence on North Caldwell Street last Wednesday morning, she being 26 years old. The funeral was held from the house in the afternoon of the same day. C. A. G. Thomas, pastor of the Baptist Church, officiating. The interment was in Chestnut Hill.

The infant daughter, Mary Elizabeth of Mr. and Mrs. L. G. Klutz, residents of South Clay Street, died last Wednesday afternoon. Her remains were taken to Union E. L. Church where the funeral was conducted by Rev. L. B. Spracher, and the interment was in the cemetery there.

No Central Class for the Reformed Church

About two years ago certain churches' pastors and laymen of this church in this vicinity withdrew from the North Carolina Classis and formed a new classis known as the Central Classis.

This transaction was agreed to by the Potomac Synod at Mechanicsburg, Pa., in October 1912, but the North Carolina Classis refused to agree to the withdrawal and requested the Potomac Synod in session at Fredericksburg, Md., so rescind its former order, but as this was refused the matter was carried to the highest authority, to the General Synod, which has just closed its session at Lancaster, Pa., made a unanimous decision sustaining the North Carolina Classis. This means there is to be no Central Classis and that the churches and pastors who wished to withdraw will remain with the former synod.

Rev. W. B. Datters, pastor of Faith Reformed Church, Salisbury, led the fight for the new classis, and Rev. J. L. Murphy, of Hickory, led the forces for unity.
