Largest Animal on Earth.

The menagerie of wild animals carried with the show is complete in every detail, and contains rare and curious specimens of the earth's most interesting and curious animals.

A mile long street parade of dazzling splendor, beautiful women, and handsome horses, interspersed with three brass bands and a steam calico will traverse the streets shortly before noon, and this feature alone will be worth going many miles to see.

Cruiser North Carolina Not Allowed to Pass the Dardanelles

Washington, Sept. 3.—Turkey has declined to grant the request of the United States for permission to send the cruiser North Carolina through the Dardanelles to Constantinople to deliver \$150,000 in gold deposited here for the relief of Americans in the Ottoman Empire.

The Grand Vizier has informed the American Government that the waters of the Dardanelles are mined and that it would be unsafe for a vessel as large as the North Carolina to go through the Straits. He declared also that it might establish a precedent for the passage of other foreign warships and suggested that the American naval yacht Scorpion, on duty in Turkish waters, be sent to sea to meet the North Carolina.

United States Gains Control Colon Waters

Panama, Sept. 2.—A treaty by which the United States gains control of the waters of the harbors of Colon and Ancon, together with other valuable rights, was signed here today by William Jennings Bryan, the American Minister, and Ernest T. Lefevre, Panamanian Secretary of Foreign Relations.

The new convention has been under negotiation for four years. Early last year negotiations were broken off by Panama because it then seemed impossible to bring the two Governments into accord.

The instrument replaces what has been known as the Davis agreement of June 15, 1914, in which the boundaries of the canal zone were tentatively fixed with the understanding that a future formal treaty would fix the delimitation permanently. It also amplifies the Panama Canal treaty of November 18, 1903, under which the canal zone was acquired from Panama.

Panama, by provisions of the convention, for the first time will be placed in direct physical connection with the rest of the country. Hitherto the Capital has been cut off by the canal zone.

A large tract of fertile land called "Las Sabanas" or the Savannahs, was ceded to Panama. In this territory are located many of the handsome country estates of wealthy Panamanians.

Resolutions of Good Will by the Vestry of St. Luke's Parish.

At a meeting of the vestry of St. Luke's Parish held in the Chapter House on Wednesday evening, September 23d, 1914, at 8 o'clock, the following preamble and resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Whereas, the Rev. Frank J. Mallott, rector of St. Luke's Parish has notified the vestry by letter dated Fletcher, N. C., August 27, 1914, that he has accepted the rectory of St. Paul's Church, New Albany, Indiana, and has tendered his resignation as rector of St. Luke's Parish to take effect on October 1, 1914, therefore;

Resolved (1), That said resignation is hereby accepted to take effect on the day and date aforesaid.

Resolved (2), That such resignation is accepted with our hearty appreciation and that of the congregation for the faithful services rendered by him as rector during the last three years and ten months.

Resolved (3), That his ministrations to the poor, the sick and the afflicted of the parish have been devoted and unselfish;

Resolved (4), That his well prepared and excellent sermons have been not only gratifying to his own congregation but to the community generally. The Rev. Mallott is a preacher of great force and as a speaker in the pulpit and on the platform he has not many superiors in the American Church;

Resolved (5), That the vestry and congregation of St. Luke's Parish hereby tender to their retiring rector their best wishes for his success in his new field of labor in the Lord's vineyard; and they hereby express to him and to his family their sincere good will and kind remembrances;

Resolved (6), That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions be published in the Salisbury papers and that a copy thereof be furnished to the rector and his family.

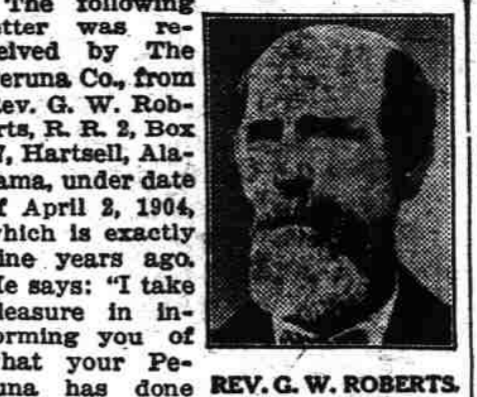
